

Council may seem necessary and expedient for the printing and distribution of pamphlets, circulars and literature, or other matter of publicity, as such Council may determine, for the purpose of advertising and publicity for such City.

192. Tax Levy To Cover Cost:

The City of Beaverton is hereby empowered and authorized to levy a special tax for the purpose of raising a sum of money, not in excess of the amount set forth in section 191 for the purpose of advertising and publicity as hereinabove set forth.

193. Petition For Tax—Election:

Before any such special tax will be levied, or any such appropriation shall be made, as provided in section 192 of this Charter, a petition favoring said appropriation and special tax shall be filed with the City Recorder. Said petition shall contain signatures of legal voters of the City of Beaverton equal to twenty percent of the number of the legal voters at the last municipal election in said City.

194. Tax Anticipation Warrants:

The Council shall have power to issue tax anticipation warrants for the payment of interest and/or principal on the bonds of the City. Said warrants shall bear interest not to exceed six per cent per annum. Said amount of warrants shall never exceed the amount of taxes uncollected.

Section 2.

This ordinance for proposed Charter amendments and adoption of Charter submitted to the voters by the Council shall be filed with the Recorder upon its approval by the Mayor, for the submission of said Charter amendments and Charter to the legal voters of the Town of Beaverton for their approval or rejection at a special election to be held, which special election is hereby called for the 21st day of July, 1933.

Section 3.

The Ballot Title for said proposed Charter amendment and Charter adoption shall be:

Amending the Charter of 1893 of the Town of Beaverton, changing the name of the "Town of Beaverton" to "The City of Beaverton" and providing and adopting a Charter therefor.

Section 4.

The Recorder of the Town of Beaverton is hereby instructed to publish the hereinbefore proposed amendments and Charter in the manner provided by this ordinance and the Beaverton Enterprise is hereby designated as the newspaper in which such publication shall be made.

WHEREAS, it is immediately necessary for the welfare, health and happiness of the inhabitants of the Town of Beaverton that said amendments and Charter be submitted, in that the old Charter is insufficient to enact ordinances in relation to the laws of the State of Oregon, NOW, THEREFORE an emergency is hereby declared to exist and this ordinance shall go into full force and effect immediately upon its adoption and approval.

Klamath Grows More Potatoes KLAMATH FALLS—Some increase in Klamath potato acreage is expected this season as the result of considerable land being planted where alfalfa was frozen out last year. There has been a greater demand for seed potatoes late in the year than usual. Several potato seed treatment trials have been started recently on the U. E. Reeder and Otto Wabbes farms by the county agent. Comparative results will be noted from the corrosive sublimate, hot formaldehyde and acid-mercury dip methods in disease control.
