Albert Rossi Applies for Draught Beer Dispenser License

Special meeting Town Council Tuesday night Town Hall was called to order by Mayor Fisher, present were Councilmen Bishop, Fordney, Koshland, and Livermore, attorney Reimer, Recorder Smith, Water Supt. Goyt.

Minutes last meeting read and approved.

There is a new star on the Beaverton horizon visible in the evening this week—W. P. Jones appointed by the mayor as Patrolman Number Two Beaverton Police force—You will see his star shining on Broadway. Mr. Jones formerly did police work in Missouri and Kansas. He also knows how to pitch horse shoes—ask Lester Squires. His appointment was confirmed by unanimous vote of the council.

A. H. Rossi applied for beer license—draught dispenser 3.2. His request was granted—first time a beer keg has shown up in Town since 1916—hops were quoted at 57 cents a pound Tuesday.

Former police officer M. W. Rice tendered his resignation as police officer—the same was accepted and ordered placed on file.

Garbage License transfers were requested by Sanitary Service, Inc., of Portland, same was taken under advisement.

Recorder was instructed to look up accident protection with State Industrial Accident Commission for members Beaverton Volunteer Fire Department.

Letters from E. R. Lundburg, attorney at law Portland, pertaining to an alleged accident that befell a Miss Lund, of Portland, which states that she fell in front of the Otto Erickson Garage, July 2, nine p. m., and received alleged injuries, the communication was referred to Attorney Reimer.

The Council offered some good suggestions for betterment of police service, same was well taken.

Two claims against the Town were read. The mayor appointed Councilman Bishop to act on Finance committee in absence of Barnes.

The claims were allowed—West Slope Water Dist., \$142.63, F. J. Clark, 75c.

Editor Enterprise

Last week an article appeared in the Beaverton Review purported to have been printed in the Portland Telegram of July 8th. The letter was addressed to Mr. Fixit, etc. See Beaverton Review of July 7th issue. This article stated that the present city water is nauseating and "dirty" and asked if there were a state health officer. It seems almost impossible to believe that anyone living in a community so enlightened as ours—and living in times so modern as ours—when matters of public health are discussed almost daily in the press—could be so grossly unacquainted with the facts. The individual who wrote that article no doubt knows that every state in the union has a health officer and has had one for the past 25 years. If the writer were so anxious to get information about a state health officer any local physician could have given the desired information.

The article was written apparently not for information but for the purpose of causing dissension. The writer hoped to "dirty" up the minds of the Beaverton community against our present water supply. There is likely to be "dirty" or unsatisfactory water both as to taste or odor, near the end of a pipeline. A dead end is produced—the water is not circulating rapidly—as on a main line and has a tendency to stagnate. This happens under any system of water supply and has happened before under the old system as individuals of standing and reliability in the community can testify.

The new well water has been tested a number of times and is pure. It is absolutely bacteria free. Anyone wishing to test the water may write to the State Board of Health, Oregon Bldg., Portland, Oregon, and a regular container will be mailed back. The water when properly collected and sent to the State Board of Health will be tested free—and a report issued. It is just so simple as that.

Our water aside from being moderately hard is good water according to all tests. The mineral content is normal. One of the main mineral constituents is Calcium, which is one of the very necessary minerals, especially for children in the development of bone and teeth. The Calcium in our water makes it very desirable and offsets any unfavorable qualities. In the discussion of our water it would seem to be the patriotic line of duty of every high minded citizen of our community to cease scattering abroad these petty complaints against our present water supply. It is most undesirable advertising. Let us wash our dirty linen at home and keep still in public. Try to boost our community and build it up rather than tear it down. If you cannot say good things about our community—say nothing at all—or move on!
