Second Cover Spray for Apples and Pears Now Due

Apple and pear growers in the Willamette Valley should apply the second cover spray now for the control of codling moth, according to B. G. Thompson, entomologist of the Oregon Experiment Station. For the past two nights there has been a considerable flight of codling moths and second peak of egg deposition has been reached. The eggs will hatch in from 6 to 16 days, depending on weather conditions. The next spray should be applied before these eggs hatch.

The spray is powdered lead arsenate used at the rate of 3 pounds to 100 gallons of water. In orchards where codling moth is not a serious problem 2 pounds of powdered lead arsenate to 100 gallons of water is sufficient to give commercial control. Calcium arsenate has been used in the Willamette Valley for codling moth control with control only slightly less than with lead arsenate and without injury to the leaves or fruit.

Thoroughness of application is essential in codling moth control. The foliage as well as the entire surface of every apple and pear should be thoroughly covered with the spray solution if worm injury is to be prevented. It is especially important that the upper third of the tree be thoroughly covered as a majority of the eggs are laid in this portion of the tree.

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COUNTY AGENT NOTES

What possible benefit can a Washington county farmer growing wheat get out of the agricultural adjustment program? What is the nature of the agreement and the probable amount of the reduction he must agree to in order to receive the compensation payment? What is the probable amount of this payment, when will it be paid, and how is its amount determined? What is meant by "allotment" and how is the individual allotment for each farmer, voluntarily accepting the plan, decided upon?

First public meetings in Washington county for consideration and explanation of these questions and others in connection with the wheat adjustment program will be held in the Hillsboro chamber of commerce rooms at 9 a. m. Thursday, July 20; and in the Star theatre in Sherwood, at 9 a. m. Friday, July 21. Representatives of the extension service who were recently called to Spokane by the national administrators of the act will be present to go over the plan in detail. The meetings will begin at the indicated hour and continue through the day as long as necessary to present the plan in detail and answer questions of growers.

Regardless of how extensively wheat may be grown in any section, farmers are to be permitted to take advantage of the provisions of the adjustment act if they desire to do so. The whole plan is based upon voluntary agreements by the farmer and apparently is a plan that is not going to hurt the grower as he may withdraw at any time by repaying whatever sum has been advanced to him as compensated adjusted payments. The funds for making these payments are obtained from the processor's tax which has already gone into effect. Costs of administering the act also come from the same funds.

Opening for Higher Education Schools Set

The University of Oregon, Oregon State college and state normal schools at Ashland, Monmouth, LaGrande, will open for the coming school year on September 18. All freshmen will report to the university and the state college for "freshmen week" at this time. Old students will register at the university on September 20 and at the college on September 23.

All normal school students will report on September 18, with the first two days given over to placement tests and registration. The Medical School in Portland will open September 30.
