State Grange Master on
Governing Board Farmers
Insurance Exchange

The annual state convention held recently in Portland by the Farmers Automobile Inter Insurance Exchange was attended by two hundred fifty of the company's employees and sales men from all sections of Oregon and part of Washington. WHEAT ADJUSTMENT
PLAN FORMINGFarmers Own Report will
Speed up Payment

With preliminary organization of the wheat adjustment plan rapidly taking shape in this county, wheat growers are in a position to hasten its completion and expedite the first cash benefit payments by preparing their own individual records of wheat production for the years 1930, 1931 and 1932. A preliminary committee working with the county agent has now divided the county into seven communities as suggested under the organization setup. Farmers in these districts acting on the advisory committee are as follows: Sherwood, Ferd Langer; Laurel, Farmington, Blooming, John Kanna; Hazeldale, Orenco, W. J. Enschede; West Union, Bethany, A. L. Croen; Schefflin, Roy, Greenville, J. M. Vanderzanden; Forest Grove, Verboort, Gales Creek, Glen Ritchey; Patton Valley, Laurel wood, committee man yet to be named.

The next step will be to organize these communities and receive three them the application of growers for their individual allotments. This will require submission and inspection of past production data. In this way the individual farmer can help himself and his neighbors by having the information in good shape in advance. By use of threshing machine records, sales records, warehouse receipts or other sources of information such as testimonials by neighbors, each grower is to figure out not only his acreage but his production for the past three years at least, and preferably for five years. That means first of all for the crop years 1930, 1931 and 1932, and if possible for the years 1929 and 1928 as well.

While the national plan calls for basing individual allotments on a percentage of the past three years' crops requests were made from the west that four years be used as the base in summer fallow territory. Indications are that in some instances, four or even five years may be used, hence the advisability of every farmer being prepared with all such production information before the community groups get together.

Once the individual grower's past average production are determined and accepted the assignment of an allotment will be a comparatively simple matter as it is fixed at 4 per cent of the average annual production—unless crop failures or other special circumstances during the base period make some adjustment necessary. Similarly his total acreage to be allowed will be easy to arrive at by applying the percentage reduction to be announced by Secretary Wallace to his average acreage. Any variation in the acreage reduction up to the maximum of 20 per cent will have nothing to do with the individual allotment of bushels on which adjustment payments will be made.

Washington county, with a total average production of approximately 648,000 bushels according to government figures has a real "stake" in the success of the wheat plan, first results of which will be cash payments being given this fall. The county has given an allotment of about 350,000 bushels which means that this amount times 20 cents or \$70,000 is the amount of cash available this fall if all wheat growers in the county joined the plan. In addition, another approximately \$28,000 will be forthcoming next spring, depending on the exact payment, announced as from 8 to 10 cents a bushel. The adjustment payments in the 1934 and 1935 marketing years may be more or less, depending upon circumstances and the decision of the Secretary of Agriculture.

Some have asked whether the government will make the total benefit payments to this county regardless of how many farmers join the plan. This is not the case as the ruling is plain that no individual gets more than his fixed proportionate share. Cash for any "unused" allotments here will not come to the county at all, but presumably will stay in the United States treasury.
