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ALL WHEAT GROWERS ELIGIBLE TO SHARE CONTROL BENEFITS

Organization Meetings Are
Scheduled for Various
Districts Next Week

Every wheat grower, no matter what he does with his wheat, is eligible to share in the benefits of the wheat control program. Likewise every farmer who grows wheat, regardless of how small his acreage, is permitted to take advantage of the plan if he desires to do so, although the benefits may not be sufficient to make the plan worth while where the acreage is very small.

Preliminary meetings in each of the seven districts will be completed this week and the application forms for allotment contracts are now in the mail to nearly every farmer in the county. Growers should prepare their statements and turn in the signed applications at the organization meeting for their district.

Organization meetings for the various districts are as follows: Monday, August 28, West Union School; Tuesday, August 29, Aloha Grange Hall; Wednesday, August 30, Moore's Hall, Roy; Thursday, August 31, Forest Grove Chamber of Commerce; Friday, September 1, Gaston; Friday, September 1, Laurel Community Hall; Friday, September 1, Sherwood City hall.

The wheat plan is designed to do just two things—cut down the total production of wheat in this country to approximately what the markets will take, and insure a fair return to the grower for the proportion of his crop corresponding to the proportion of the national crop that is used for food in this country. To do this the wheat control administration contracts with farmers to reduce acreage to a limited extent and to pay them cash benefits for so doing. The general marketing of wheat is not interfered with at all, so that the grower proceeds to sell his crop when and where he pleases, or feed it up on his own place just as he would had there been no wheat plan.

Because the benefit payments are entirely separate from returns from the sale of the wheat, all the immediate benefits of the plan will go to those who make contracts with the government to help control acreage. This opportunity is open to every wheat grower large or small but one must decide this fall what he will do as lists will be closed after a certain time for the balance of the three-year life of the wheat plan.

SIXTH STREET SENTIMENT

Oregon's Credit—State of Maryland has just borrowed \$7,881,000 at rates of interest varying from 1% to 3.2%, according to maturities ranging from 1 to 15 years. State of Maine sold \$800,000 of 6-months tax anticipation notes, now publicly offered to yield 5-8 of 1%, or at annual rate of 1 1/4%. New Hampshire recently borrowed \$4,356,000 through sale of 3 1/2% bonds. Its population is approximately half that of Oregon; its net bonded debt of \$11,749,730—including this issue—is roughly but one-fifth that of Oregon. Oregon has been unable to borrow outside money at 6%. No further comment is needed to emphasize the importance of trying through all possible means to improve Oregon's credit standing—Oregon Voter.

The voters of Forest Grove Tuesday voted to prevent the sale of beer within the town limits by three votes. The vote was 386 votes against the sale and 383 for. This is the first time the issue has come to a vote here.

Mass Meeting Called In Regard to New Beaverton Charter

Call meeting of the Town Council was held Monday night. Present were Councilmen Barnes, Bishop, Boswell, Fordney, Koshland, Livermore, Mayor Fisher, Recorder Smith, Attorney Reimer, Water Supt. Goyt, Reading clerk Wilson, Chief of Police Peets.

The proposition of two mass meetings at the Beaverton High School Auditorium on Friday night, September 1 and September 8, 8 o'clock p. m., for the purpose of explaining the new city charter to all the citizens of Beaverton met full approval of the Council. All citizens of Beaverton will be invited to be present and hand in written questions on new city charter. Town Attorney Reimer will answer the questions for the Town.

On the City Charter the two items of \$500 and \$5000 funds for advertising purposes to induce new business enterprises to locate in Beaverton—will be eliminated, as this seems to meet objections.

Council Resolution No. 7 was introduced by Councilman Fordney and passed by unanimous vote, provides for 600 cubic feet of water during month of September for all Town water customers at the minimum rate of \$2.

Petition from Conollys Cash Store, Safeway and Manning's stores for early closing local business houses, 6:30 p. m., week days and 8 p. m. on Saturdays, petition was referred to Town Attorney Reimer.

Water Supt. Goyt recommended that the master meter be installed at the reservoir to determine amount of water sent down the mains to Beaverton—his recommendation was well taken, the meter will be installed in the near future.

The recorder was instructed to send out notices each month to delinquent water accounts.

Councilman Fordney reported that it will require 1162 feet ten inch water pipes to replace the present high way crossing Town mains at the Y east of Town—the recorder was instructed to obtain permission from the State Highway department to lay the water pipe along north side of said highway.

Claim Beaverton Rock Co. for \$150 on account for crushed rock delivered on Town streets allowed.

Distinguished guests present were Lynden Meyers, attorney at law, Peter J. Hupp, the new restaurant man and Elmer Benson the popular meat cutter, who ground hamburger two months for Fawn Warrior.

Motion to adjourn on call carried.

COUNTY GRANGES TO HAVE BOOTHS AT 4-H CLUB FAIR

Plans for Two Evenings
Entertainments Have
Been Completed

Over 75 head of dairy cattle, well over a hundred birds in the poultry show, a dozen hogs, about 10 milk goats, seven sheep and some 40 or 50 rabbits will be seen at the county fair grounds this Friday and Saturday in the biggest show of 4-H club stock ever seen in Washington County. Several head of cattle, hogs and sheep with a large list of poultry entries from the Smith-Hughes agricultural students at Forest Grove will swell the show to proportions seldom seen at a county fair. Every minute of the two day show will be crowded with events which will be of interest to every farmer of Washington County.

The Farmers Union Girls' Milking contest at 8:00 p. m. on Saturday will see nine very charming and very determined girls competing for the title of Washington County's champion girl milker and for the large silver loving cup which will go to the local unit whose representative wins the contest. This cup must be won three different years for permanent possession. Webb Hughes of Forest Grove will act as master of ceremonies for the dairy maids contest. All bachelors with dairy yearnings are expected to be present.

Programs for two evenings entertainments are complete. Dancing will be in order each evening after the early part of the program is done Friday evening the Hillsboro Grange Drill Team will put on a drill demonstration which they promise will be well worth seeing. Mrs. Osborne's Juniors have been enthusiastically received, will give two humorous readings and Toni and Adelheid Nussbaumer will give an accordion duet. Brown's 6 piece orchestra from Laurel will play for the dances from 9 to midnight. Sound equipment has been installed which will make all speakers and music easily audible in all parts of the huge auditorium.

will follow immediately after the girls milking contest. The always popular girls style revue is being put on this year for the first time as part of the evening show. Solo numbers by Gertrude Smith, soprano, E. E. Arrant, basso and Ruth Boyle, violinist, will be followed by a farce style revue by 4-H boys. This will be a parody on the girl's style revue. The Nightingale Orchestra of Verboort will furnish the music for dancing after the entertainment.

The 4-H club booths which proved such a popular feature of the fair last year will be even more extensive this year. Early this week different 4-H clubs picked out their booths and started decoration. The purpose of these booths is to show the work the individual clubs are doing. These booths will be in building Number Two where they were last year. All along the east side of this building the Future Farmers will display their crops and shop exhibits.

The 4-H club crops, vegetables, forestry and handicraft exhibits will be placed in the main 4-H club building. New decorative feature this year will include a section of a wooden hoop silo built by Copeland Lumber Co which will serve as an entrance to the exhibit. A door cut through the silo will give admittance to the exhibits. One entire side of this part of the building has been built up with hay to resemble the hay mows of a typical barn interior. In one corner the forestry club, led by Wesley Batchelder, will put in a rock pool with cat-tails, ferns, and young firs as a background. In the other end the handicraft club, led by T. J. Nault and C. R. Riley, is building a regular farm work shop with lathe, forge, anvil, work bench and tools. The vegetable exhibits will be placed on moss on a bench the full length of the hay mow. The handicraft exhibits will be placed in the center and the forestry exhibits along the outside wall.

L. J. Allen assistant State Club leader, will judge the crops, vegetable, handicraft and forestry exhibits as well as the showmanship and demonstration contests. Chet Bergstrom, county agent of Tillamook County, will be judge of cattle, swine, sheep and goats, and E. R. Stromquist will judge poultry.

Eight Granges in the county are installing booths in the regular grange booth buildings. Granges putting in booths are: Leedy, Washington, Gales, Tigard, Hillsboro, Beaverton, Scholls and Sherwood. In the same building several business firms will have commercial booths.
