Inflammation, fever, infection and even death may follow injudicious exposure to the sun, the burn of which is not different from that of fire or steam.

Good rules for bathers to follow are to keep out of the summer sun between the hours of 10 a. m. and 3 p. m. except for brief periods, to cultivate tan gradually, and not seek from a week-end trip to return home with a certificate of tan to a season at the seaside.

Just now, when the practice of exposing children to the sun for health reasons has brought about a special garb for the sunning, the warning is in place—that the period covered and the eyes be protected by dark glasses.

CATLIN SCHOOL OPENS FALL TERM ON SEPTEMBER 12

HAL HOSS ANNOUNCES "GOOD LUCK" DAYS FOR TRIPS

Persons who are superstitious about "good luck" days to start motor trips will be interested in recent reports from the office of Hal E. Hoss secretary of state, concerning "good record" days from the accident standpoint.

Contrary to common belief, most accidents occur on Saturday and Monday rather than on Sunday, and contrary to superstitious ideas, Friday is not a bad day for accidents. Instead, Friday rates next to Wednesday in having the fewest number of accidents reported in Oregon since January 1, 1933.

Approximately 18 per cent of the 10,271 accidents reported so far this year happened on Saturday, 14 per cent on Sunday, 16 per cent on Monday, and 13 per cent on each of the remaining days.

India's Monsoon Depended Upon to Make the Crops

The monsoon, which sweeps across the Indian ocean during the season from the end of May to September is one of the most important factors in Indian prosperity.

Nearly the whole amount of rain which falls in India during the year comes in the monsoon, says the Montreal Herald, and if the downpour falls Indian peasants' and farmers' crops are ruined. Anxiously they wait every year for the heavy clouds to burst, when the wind has rolled them across the Arabian sea to India.

In the early days of navigation the Arabs and the eastern voyagers who first sailed the Indian ocean, depended on the monsoon, and the early European trading companies regulated their voyages to the east according to the monsoons.

Today sailors vary their course during the monsoon, which is really a reversal of the normal winds over the ocean.

In the Arabian sea the normal wind is the northeast trade wind, but actually it blows only in the cool season. When the sun is overhead in the north of India a depression develops in the northwest. As a result, the southeast trade wind blows over the Equator and then circles round the center of depression or low pressure, reaching India as a southwest wind.

Copernicus Theory That Earth Moves Around Sun

A demonstration of the truth of the theory of Copernicus, that the earth moves around the sun, instead of the sun moving around the earth, is not made easily without a knowledge of various physical and astronomical phenomena.

There is an annual change in the apparent position of the stars, known as their annual parallax. Either the stars make this annual circuit and all of them in the same length of time, or the earth makes an annual circuit in space which causes the apparent annual movement of the stars. The fact that they are all made in the same length of time makes it more probable that they are due to the motion of the earth than that they are due to the individual motions of the stars themselves.

The work of Kepler in connection with the laws of planetary motion, of Galileo, with the use of the telescope, and of Newton in connection with the laws of gravitation, strengthened the Copernican theory which in the course of centuries has gained general acceptance.—Detroit News.

OREGON PEARS FOUND RICH IN PRIZED FOOD ELEMENTS

Any time Oregon pear growers decide to tell the world about the advantage of eating frequently a rich, ripe Bosc, Anjou or Winter Nells, they will be able to get plenty of health arguments from a new Oregon State college experiment station bulletin entitled "Biochemical Investigations of Certain Winter Pears."

Behind this formidable sounding title James C. Moore, assistant horticulturist of the station, reveals the results of research into just what winter pears are made of and what place they might be reasonably expected to fill in the diet.

The report he just makes shows that in the matter of alkalinity, winter pears rate ahead of some famous fruits widely advertised for this property. In what is termed "buffer value," used in measuring the probable effect of foods in certain conditions such as malnutrition, these pears show up exceptionally favorably. In copper content, considered somewhat related to prevention or treatment of anemia, winter pears are three to four times better than other fruits.

The research was carried on at the college in cooperation with the North West Pear bureau. Similar studies have shown these pears to be high in vitamin content and to contain large amounts of levulose sugar at some stages of development. Fruit production is now the major fruit industry of the state.

SEASON HERE TO LOCATE GRASSHOPPER EGG BEDS
Looking ahead to a possible grasshopper outbreak next year, farmers might save themselves much future loss by spotting grasshopper egg beds at this season, says Don C. Mote entomologist at Oregon State college. Trained observers report that it is about time to expect another bad outbreak of some species such as was experienced in 1915-1917 and again in 1922-23.

Swarms of grasshoppers milling around in the air or thickly bunched on the ground usually indicate they are looking for egg-laying areas on dry meadows or dry spots in irrigated districts or fields. Observation of the hill grasshoppers in parts of eastern Oregon is also recommended, as it is about time for them to become abundant. Destruction of egg beds is one of the most successful methods of fighting the hoppers.
