pear and apple movement. More orderly control of markets, resulting in better returns to producers, is hoped for.

Meanwhile the administration has put its hog slaughtering plan into effect in the middlewest and has announced that hog raisers in this state will also be eligible later to dispose of light weight pigs and heavy sows soon to farrow at premium prices. This is purely an emergency plan to avert a disastrous surplus of pork, the officials state.

More permanent plans for handling all livestock were considered at Spokane where amendments to the national code were approved and preparations made to organize the northwest states on a regional basis.
