FIRE BREAKS OUT IN BASEMENT OF CITY MEAT MARKET

Portland Fire Department Called to Assist in Extinguishing Flames

Billows of smoke pouring from the basement of the Rossi building, directly under the City Market and Grocery, brought the local fire department into action Thursday evening shortly after 6 o'clock. On investigation it was deemed advisable to call Portland for help. Engine No. 4 with Captain, crew and pumper came roaring over the Canyon road at a speed of seventy miles an hour, and were laying their hose for action a few minutes after their arrival. The experienced fighters after a whizz, a snort and a short run had the hose connected to the fire hydrant and with a pressure of 90 pounds in the mains were literally flooding the basement of the structure.

The smell of smoke mingled with that of ammonia helped to keep the crowd at a respectable distance, and within twenty minutes the fire was under control. Hillsboro department also responded to the call, but were not needed.

Only one fatality was reported. It seems that a dog sleeping in the basement was overcome by the smoke and ammonia fumes and was gathered into the ancestral paradise.

The automatic pump kept the reservoir full at all times. More thanks to Mr. Fordney and fellow workers for winning the fight to obtain our own water supply. Now, if we could only follow out the advice of the Captain of the Portland department and provide our boys with equipment such as gas masks, spray nozzle for fighting fires where smoke is too dense to enter the building, we might avert a tragic fire, as well as lower the insurance rates of the town. The Captain stated that a pumper is a most important part of fire fighting equipment.

Mayor Fisher, ever thoughtful of the other fellow, invited the Portland Captain and crew to partake of refreshments at the Greyhound Coffee Shop.

County Health Assn. Establishes Speakers Bureau for Groups

Washington County Health association has established a speakers bureau to be of service to all Womens societies, Grange and fraternal organizations or clubs wishing programs on any phase of health education and disease prevention. The Washington County Health association begins its third year of work. The years special stress will be put on immunization of Diphtheria and Smallpox. Plans are now being made for the Christmas Tuberculosis Seal sale. The returns from the seal sale are largely the maintenance of the state Tuberculosis association and the County Health associations throughout the state.

Beaverton Men to be Employed on Proposed \$75,000 Sewage Plant

At the Council meeting Monday night there were present Councilmen Barnes, Bishop, Boswell, Fordney, Koshland, Livermore, Mayor Fisher, Recorder-Treasurer Smith, Water Supt. Goyt, and Chief of Police Peets. Minutes of the last meeting read, corrected and approved.

Mr. Burton E. Palmer, executive secretary advisory board, spoke of the proposed sewer system without cost to taxpayers except cost of election, and etc. Federal plan levying nominal service charge per residence and business houses, similar to present water plan, bringing in outside money.

The Government will donate thirty per cent of total cost, balance will be loaned Beaverton thirty years time at 4%.

Will employ all local labor first—at 50c per hour, 30 hours per week—making a big payroll for local citizens—that will help business men during construction of said sewer, which is sponsored by President Roosevelt and Governor Meier to help bring good times again.

Motion by Boswell, seconded by Koshland that an ordinance be drawn authorizing the State Reconstruction Advisory board to make a survey of the proposed sewer system for Beaverton, estimating cost and giving other data. The vote was: Yes, Bishop, Boswell, Fordney, Koshland, Nays 2, Barnes and Livermore.

John H. Travis of the firm of Forrester & Lewis engineers, Portland, spoke on sewer disposal plant, urging members of Council to visit their plant in Portland.

Motion by Barnes seconded by Koshland to purchase one copy Oregon Laws 1933—pertaining to cities and towns of Oregon for \$3. Motion prevailed.

It was decided that council and Mayor will meet Tuesday a. m. at "Y" on pipe line East of Town to outline improvements.

Boswell moved that Oregon Electric officials at Hillsboro be notified to place new side walk across right of way at North Main street connecting with new walk by George Hughson, Mrs. Masters and Dr. Mason, recently completed. The recorder carried out said instruction.

Ordinance 152 providing for acceptance by the Town of Beaverton of Beaverton assessment bonds in payment for street assessments—was passed by the Council by unanimous vote.

Councilman Fordney reported prices on water pipe for construction work East of Beaverton.

Councilmen Barnes and Bishop, special committee appointed by Mayor Fisher to confer with Paul Patterson, City Attorney, Hillsboro, J. R. McCready, City Attorney, Forest Grove—legal matters foreclosure quieting title—made their report to the Council. The Mayor thanked the committee and dismissed it.

Claims against Town were OK'd by Finance committee, warrants ordered drawn J. W. Sprague 47c Pete Van De Hey \$1.40, Hal E. Hoss \$3.

All able-bodied men of Beaverton desiring to work at 50c per hour, 30 hours per week N. I. R. A. plan on the proposed new sewer system—are requested to register at the Town office near Stage Depot either Friday or Saturday night, Sept. 22 or 23 at 8 p. m. All Beaverton men are to be used first on proposed new sewer construction.

Motion to adjourn on call carried.

Horace Nelson who is employed at the dairy, received severe head lacerations while endeavoring to stop the team started by Freddie and Rose Vwahien who were riding in the wagon. Rose received minor face injuries and Fred die injured his leg when he jumped from the wagon. Mr. Nelson is in the Good Samaritan hospital and is in a very critical condition.

Business Failures Less

According to a report of Bradstreet and Dunn, business failures for the week ending September 7, totaled only 255 compared with 311 the previous week and 420 last year. It was the smallest number for several years.

PROCLAMATION

A Call to Enlist the Manpower of Beaverton

WHEREAS, the Federal Government is providing by the National Industrial Recovery Act large sums of money to be granted and or loaned to the various states and municipalities for public projects, which sums should be taken advantage of in the building of a municipal sewer plant for Beaverton and the relief of local unemployment and

WHEREAS, the Council of the Town of Beaverton has under consideration the plan of building a municipal sewer plant without cost to taxpayers—by accepting the Federal plan of charging a nominal service charge per residence similar to water service plan now in force, and

WHEREAS, that said act provides that all local labor shall be employed first and fixes the wages at fifty (50) cents per hour and thirty (30) hours per week.

THEREFORE, I, Earl E. Fisher, Mayor of the Town of Beaverton do hereby issue a call for all able bodied men living within the corporate limits of the Town of Beaverton desiring to work on said proposed sewer plant, to be present at the Town office near Stage Depot Friday night or Saturday night, 8 p. m., September 22 and September 23, and register.

Congressman Mott Main Speaker at Inter-club Kiwanis Meeting

One of the most successful and one of the most thoroughly enjoyable meetings of Beaverton Kiwanis club was that of Wednesday evening, an Inter-club meeting, with Camas-Washougal and Gresham clubs attending. Fifty-one from Camas-Washougal, seven from Gresham, and twenty-eight of the local club and their guests brought the total attendance to eighty-six, which just about taxed the seating capacity of the Kiwanis building.

Guests of Beaverton club included the Honorable James W. Mott and Mrs. Mott of Salem; Merwin Dant, Miss Dorothea Schoop and C. E. Berggren, of Aloha, Otto Erickson and Fred Sefton of Beaverton. Mr. Berggren presented two piano numbers in the popular style, which were very enjoyable. Merwin Dant presented a group of three numbers, La Forge's "Trees," Curran's "I Love Life" and a Southern number. These were beautifully done. Mr. Dant is the possessor of a rich baritone voice with an appealing quality and does his numbers in a very pleasing, unaffected style. It is certainly a joy to hear him. The audience last night showed their appreciation in no small way, and Mr. Dant responded with a request number, the ever popular "On The Road to Mandalay." Miss Dorothea Schoop was Mr. Dant's able accompanist.

Congressman James W. Mott gave the principal address of the evening on "The National Recovery Act." Mr. Mott gave an intensely interesting resume of this most vital piece of legislation from its inception down to the present time. He pointed out that much of the publicity that is being used in connection with the Act is rather misleading, and certainly not very informative. The President, at the outset, called into his counsel three outstanding economic socialists, that have been since familiarly referred to as the "Brain Trust." These three, instructors in political economy at Columbia University, are what might be called real economic socialists. The act now known as the National Recovery Act, is their answer to the President's call for a solution to our present industrial and economic ills. Mr. Mott pointed out that our nation could not long continue without serious upheaval, with twelve million people out of work. The greatest minds in the country are agreed that the National Recovery Act is our only hope. Mr. Mott's discussion of the Act included a great deal more than the brief summary given here, but space will not permit the inclusion of his remarks in their entirety. Mr. Mott is a very forceful and interesting speaker and his address was one of the finest we have had the pleasure of hearing.

Another interesting feature of the meeting was the awarding of the "Mutt" and her family to Gresham club. She has acquired five additional dogs, making six in all. These are awarded to the club having the smallest attendance at any inter-club meeting.

SEWAGE AID REFUSED

Dana Tells Portland That No U. S. Cash Available for Financing

Marshall N. Dana, advisor for the public works administration in the state, yesterday notified Commissioner Riley that Colonel H. M. Waite, deputy administrator, feels the federal government has no funds at this time to advance to the city to finance plans for the sewage disposal project.

Col. Waite suggested that the city might sell some of the bonds authorized for the project or give them as security for a loan for the money with which to get out the plans.
