All Safety Factors in Auto Tested



National Safety clinic inspection machine manufactured by Bendix Products corporation which was installed last week by Thompson & Dubey. First use of the device was witnessed by city traffic officials, motor club officers and the press, with a police car being the customer. The device checks all safety factors.

SAFETY CHECKING
DEVICES INSTALLED

Installation was completed at Thompson & Dubey, Northwest 12th avenue and Couch street, of a National Safety Clinic inspection machine designed to inspect all safety factors connected with operation of an automobile. This is first installation of this device in Portland, and third in the Northwest.

The "triple check" which this device gives a car includes steering brake and the headlight. There are a hydraulic hoist which permits checking of tires, undue wear on king pins, brushings, etc., and for loose spokes.

The machine equipment checks chassis and axles for squareness camber and caster of wheels, the steering apparatus, foot brakes and hand brake, and the headlights. There are 82 items to be marked for each car on an inspection sheet, which is made for each car.

Announcement is made that there is no charge for the inspection.

The device is manufactured by the Bendix Products corporation, South Bend, Ind., for which Charles Horn is local zone manager.
