PERIOD TO TURN IN WHEAT ALLOTMENT RECORD EXTENDED

Directors of the Washington county wheat control association decided, in a meeting Tuesday evening, to hold open the period for turning in applications for wheat allotments until October 10. This is the latest date on which farmers may make application for acceptance of the wheat plan, according to Wm. F. Cyrus, county agent. Members of the board expressed themselves as of the opinion that farmers of this county have had ample opportunity to become informed regarding the provisions of plan but they would allow them until the date mentioned to turn in their papers.

Some farmers have objected to the plan on the ground that they are "tied up too tight" for a long period of time. These people should bear in mind that the contract is but for the two crop years of 1934 and 1935. In other words the participating farmer agrees to make the required reductions in his wheat acreage for the two crops and in return receives the benefit payments for the crops of 1933, 1934 and 1935. Others have stated that the plan will result in the acreage that is taken out of wheat production being planted to other crops and this will hurt the market for these other grain and seed crops. This latter cannot happen as under the regulations regarding the use of the contracted acreage the farmer is not permitted to grow anything on this land which will be sold either directly or indirectly.

Community committees are completing their work on the applications and the allotment committee will start work the first of the week. When allotments have been approved the contracts will be made out and offered to those farmers who have turned in applications. Any farmer who may be uncertain as to how the plan would operate for him should see his community committeeman or call at the county agent office not later than Tuesday, October 10.

Beaverton Water Rates Changed by Council for Winter Months

The regular monthly meeting of the city council was held Monday evening. Minutes of the previous meeting being disposed of, the police department report was read.

A decision was reached by the council to confer with Charles Berthold regarding the covering of a water main in the Berthold addition. Ethel Hocken's proposition of dividing assessed property was laid on the table for future consideration.

Resolution No. 7 introduced by Councilman Fordney regulating the sale of water in Beaverton was read as follows: Whereas, the Beaverton municipal water system is a success—and amply supply of water is obtainable, and whereas more water for the same money will be of great benefit to the people of Beaverton and suburbs in watering their garden and beautifying their lawns, making Beaverton truly the "City of Homes," therefore be it resolved by the people of the Town of Beaverton that during the months from October to May inclusive, the Town of Beaverton shall sell 450 cubic feet of water to the citizens of Beaverton for \$2 minimum rate—that during the months from June to September they shall sell the citizens 600 cubic feet of water for \$2 minimum rate. This change took effect Monday October 2.

Resolution No. 12 commending the Southern Pacific on constructing a new sidewalk at Beaverton was introduced by Councilman Boswell. The resolution provides: Whereas, the Town of Beaverton appreciated the ready response of the Southern Pacific Company to the request for the construction of a new sidewalk at the S. P. R. crossing on Watson street at Broadway, therefore be it resolved by the people of the Town of Beaverton that in token of appreciation the Town Council, hereby extend a vote of thanks to G. W. Hendren, Roadmaster, A. Maundson, section foreman and section crew of the company for the excellent service rendered pedestrians for our community.

Application for beer licenses for another quarter were granted C. J. Beach for bottle dispensary, George Thynge, A. H. Rossi, S. Mages & Son, and Mrs. Anna Berthold for draught dispensary.

Mayor Fisher and Councilman Bishop submitted their report on dedicating Mill street as a street.

The report of the committee of the whole was made on fire fighting equipment. Mayor Fisher thanked the committee for their work and dismissed the committee. The recorder was authorized to notify F. P. Tracy of the Sanderson Safety Supply Co., AT. 9817 in time to come to the next council meeting.

Motion was made by Livermore seconded by Councilman Fordney that the refunding bonds be dated Oct. 1, 1933, and printed in accordance with the Ordinance No. 147 immediately.

Claims against the city were read and referred to the finance committee. In the absence of Councilman Barnes, Mayor Fisher appointed Councilman Bishop to serve on the finance committee.

Water Supt. Goyt reported that the water from the well was muddy when the pump began to operate and recommended that something be done about it. It was left to the Chairman of the Water Committee.

County Health Assn. to Meet at Beaverton Hi School Thursday Oct. 12

The Washington county Public Health association will hold their next meeting at the Beaverton high school auditorium at 8 p. m. Thursday evening, October 12.

Representatives will be present from every community in the county and the program is to be a very instructive one for those interested in health and children's welfare.

Mr. Chamberlain of the State association, will speak on "What the County Health Program has to Offer the County"; Miss Dixon, county nurse has chosen for her topic "Nurses Services," and "Immunization." Dr. J. O. Robb of Hillsboro, will explain the "Tie between the Oregon T. B. association and the County Health Association."

There will be other speakers and much to discuss and become informed about. The Parent-Teacher association is especially urged to attend as the program should appeal to parents.

Budget Committee give Report at Special Meeting

A special meeting of the Town Council was called to order by Mayor Fisher Wednesday evening.

Present were Councilmen Bishop, Boswell, Fordney, Koshland, Livermore, Mayor Fisher and Recorder Smith, Town Attorney Reimer. Absent Councilman Barnes and Reading Clerk Wilson, also Water Supt. Goyt and Fire Chief Beach, who came in later.

The minutes of Oct. 2, were read and approved as read.

A proclamation by Governor Meier on Fire Prevention Week was read.

Chairman Fordney of the Water Dept. reported that the West Slope District Supt. had asked him about buying Beaverton water. He also reported that the reason that the well had been muddy at times was because the flow of water was increasing. The Recorder was instructed to look up data on the cost of producing water.

The council listened to a report by A. A. Frenz on fire apparatus.

At this time the budget committee, consisting of Dr. C. E. Mason, chairman, and Doy Gray, M. W. Manning, J. W. Sprague, W. E. McCloskey, took up the budget prepared by the Recorder and gave it thorough consideration.

Motion by Livermore seconded by Bishop that the budget as reported by the budget committee be accepted. The vote was Yeas 5, Bishop, Boswell, Fordney, Koshland, Livermore. Nays none. Absent 1, Barnes.

Motion by Boswell seconded by Fordney that the budget committee be given in writing our heartfelt thanks for their work on the budget.

Motion by Fordney seconded by Boswell that the Chairman of the Finance committee, Livermore, be authorized to seek deeds on the property foreclosed by the town for a consideration of \$1 each.

Scarlet Fever Serum Given Number of Children

Scarlet fever in the community has necessitated the administration of serum to a number of Beaverton children to prevent an epidemic in the town. So far there are no new cases, according to Dr. Mason.

Persons becoming injured the past week have kept the doctor well occupied in relieving suffering.

The little son of F. E. Doern injured his right arm Thursday, when he accidentally got in a grain cutter. Several stitches were necessary to close the wound.

Arthur McCullen had his finger crushed Tuesday, while at Lewis' Rock Quarry.

Mrs. Benson, 80 years, old mother of James Benson, fell and broke her right arm at the wrist also just below the shoulder joint. The break was in the same place as one she sustained some twenty years ago. Such a fracture at her age is considered a very serious one.

Dr. Mason reports that Barbara, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Geo. Scott of route 3 is confined to her home with a severe throat infection and the flu.

Addison Wright of route 1 was taken to the Good Samaritan hospital Saturday suffering from an injured left foot. A truck ran over his foot while he was working in Portland.

Portland to Charge for Fire Aid to Outsiders

An ordinance is being provided by the Portland city council to take care of calls for help from outside communities in case of fire.

The ordinance provides that cities and towns which may need this service shall deposit with the city treasurer \$300. A charge for a fire call will be \$100 for the first hour of the run and \$75 for each additional hour.

In the event that fire apparatus is needed in the city it is not bound to send engines elsewhere. Neither is the city liable for any damage arising out of accidents in which the apparatus may figure on the way to one of these outside calls. The local fire chief may also withdraw any apparatus from an outside call if the engines and firemen are needed in Portland.
