COUNCIL APPOINTS FRED H. GOYT AS CITY WATER CLERK

Councilman Koshland, chairman of the Civic Improvements, reported his progress on the board sidewalk on Stott street at the town council meeting Monday night, October 16. Councilman Boswell, of the sidewalks committee was referred to for further work at this location.

Councilman Livermore gave a report on the proposition of Mrs. Ethel Edwards on her property on Lombard street. It was decided to demand 100 feet from the street line.

The recorder was instructed to send Mrs. Chas. Eller of Aurora, Oregon, a copy of the water rules. A claim submitted by A. L. Amacher for \$18 for the September audit was allowed and paid.

Fred H. Goyt, water superintendent, was named also as water clerk with a salary of \$100 a month, by the town council. He succeeds Lewis Smith who will remain recorder-treasurer.

Resolution No. 13 was read by Councilman Boswell condemning unlawful appropriation of water from Town mains, recommending ordinance be drawn designating said crime as a felony. Whereas, during the month of October, 1931, extensive digging operations on certain town mains, both within and without city limits, by Town officials at that time revealed that certain people well fixed financially were unlawfully appropriating water from town water mains—within the Town of Beaverton and without the Town of Beaverton—with taps around the meters. Whereas, the Town of Beaverton on account of this unlawful practice was loser several thousand dollars and whereas in some cases poor men have been arrested for stealing a loaf of bread, but in these particular instances has not one cent been paid into the Town treasury for water unlawfully taken from town water mains here mentioned now, therefore be it resolved by the people of the Town of Beaverton that in order to protect Beaverton's water supply and prevent further deprivations of this character in the future that the Town Attorney is hereby requested to draw up proper ordinance making it a felony for the misappropriation of water tapping around meter or other unlawful manner of obtaining water from town water mains. Motion by Boswell seconded by Bishop that Council Resolution No. 13 be adopted. The vote was: Yeas 5, Bishop, Boswell, Fordney, Koshland, Livermore, nays none. Absent 1 Barnes.

Councilman Fordney reported on the pipe to be covered in Berthold addition. It was decided that Mayor Fisher and Water Supt. Goyt would see Mr. Berthold about covering the pipe.

Councilman Fordney reported on his meeting with the state engineer and gave the engineer's recommendation of getting a list of the sanitary fixtures in each residence in town.

The Finance Committee recommended forwarding a letter requesting a temporary allocation of \$75,000.

Motion by Bishop seconded by Fordney that the budget be recalled to the council for further consideration.

Auditor Amacher spoke of the collections on the sidewalks recently built and the tile on Lombard St. The recorder was instructed to look up the date of the notice to the owners of property where we have built sidewalks i. e., Miss Ida Alexander and Mrs. Geo. Bridwell.

A called meeting of the Town Council was held Wednesday evening.

Councilman Livermore spoke on V. A. Wood's proposition of rebonding. It was referred to Attorney Reimer for further information.

Councilman Livermore spoke of receiving a deed from Mrs. Ethel Edwards for 120 feet of her property, measured from the center line of Lombard St., which was referred to Mr. Reimer.

Motion by Livermore seconded by Bishop that upon acceptance of a deed from Ethel L. Hocken Edwards covering the east 120 feet of Lots 41 and 44 of Hockens Acres according to the unrecorded plat thereof we will release the assessment lien covering the balance of the east half of said tract.

Motion by Bishop seconded by Fordney that the budget as revised be adopted and advertised and submitted to the people for objection.

A. L. Berg and W. E. McCloskey have been busy the last several days registering approximately 150 applicants for work on federal projects. More than 400 men are expected to apply for employment according to Francis Livermore, local member of the county relief committee.

ANNUAL RED CROSS ROLL CALL TO BE FROM NOV. 11-30

Red Cross volunteers who are perfecting their organization for the annual enrollment of members, November 11-30, yesterday learned from W. F. Norman, chairman that more than 25,000,000 persons in the United States have received flour and clothing through Red Cross distribution of these government surplus commodities.

The local chapter has taken a prominent part in this nation-wide unemployment relief program by ministering unto men, women and children in distress.

Norman says hundreds of women have given hours of service in making garments from cotton materials and in placing other ready-made articles of clothing where they will do the most good. The men, also, have done their part in handling the flour.

James L. Fleser vice chairman of the Red Cross at Washington, D.C., on a recent tour of the Pacific area, stated that every State and practically every county in the nation has shared in the distribution of 85,000,000 bushels of wheat and 844,000 bales of cotton.

Flour was placed on the pantry shelves of 5,803,000 families in 3,081 counties and clothing given to 5,465,410 families in 3,075 counties. Flour distribution amounted to 10,688,307 barrels. In making the distribution of clothing the Red Cross issued 92,847,060 yards of cotton cloth and 55,203,612 ready made garments.

During the year the national Red Cross expended for all services, \$4,041,000 while the 3,700 chapters expended an additional \$7,500,000 in meeting the needs of their local communities.
