PLANNING SOME USE OF THE IDLE HOURS

Grange Recognizes a Serious Danger And Endeavors to Correct It

Following the adoption of NRA working hours in most lines of industry, with consequent increase of available hours in recreation or idleness, the Grange organization has sensed the serious problem here involved, and has widely sounded a warning note against the possibilities of danger for the American people unless these idle hours can be put to actual use through definite community programs.

In line with its own long-established custom of inaugurating better-

ment projects in local environments, the Grange is endeavoring to set in motion a greater number of projects than ever for the coming fall and winter, hoping thereby to enlist universal community interest and thus get much beneficial work done, at the same time utilizing the otherwise idle time of many people. From one New England country town comes the report that the Grange has succeeded in signing up every able-bodied man in the entire village to the promise that he will give one half day's time of each week to some local project of improvement.

In many rural villages the Grange is planning to stage this winter more dramatic features, minstrels, concerts, prize-speaking contests and other events of competitive nature, than ever before—all designed to maintain community interest, to enlist the enthusiasm and efforts of as many people as possible, and so to "take up the slack," naturally resulting from the lessened working schedule of that vicinity. Few will challenge the statement that nothing the Grange can do in the present urgent situation of national life is more important than its endeavors above outlined.

Radio Shorthand Course Starts

CORVALLIS—A radio course in shorthand transcription for the benefit of shorthand classes in Oregon high schools, has been started again this year over the state-owned KOAC. This is the fourth year this service has been provided through the cooperation of the station and the department of secretarial science at Oregon State college. H. T. Vance, head of the department, conducts a half-hour lesson each week on Wednesday evenings from 7:45 to 8:15 o'clock. Last year from 50 to 60 transcripts were received weekly after each broadcast.
