FOREST GROVE MAN TO BE CANDIDATE FOR CIRCUIT JUDGESHIP

Loyal M. Graham, Forest Grove attorney, will be a candidate for circuit judge of the 19th district, composed of Washington and Tillamook counties according to a decision announced this week. His formal announcement of candidacy with the secretary of state will follow later. The decision was made at this early date according to Graham in order that voters may have ample time to inform themselves as to his qualifications for the position.

Graham will be a candidate at the May election of next year on the non-partisan judiciary ballot, the type of ballot for judiciary officers recently introduced in Oregon and for which Graham actively campaigned in Oregon for a number of years.

Graham is well known in Washington county having practiced law in Forest Grove since 1911 and having represented this county in the House of Representatives in the sessions of 1919, 1920, 1923, 1925, and 1927. In the legislature he served on the roads and highways committee preparing a number of pieces of important legislation such as the original gasoline tax law and laws in regard to automobile licensing. Roads have always been a particular hobby with him, much of his time having been devoted to the advocacy of good roads.

Agricultural Background
Graham was born in Butler county, Pennsylvania. When he was six years of age he moved with his parents to Delaware county, Iowa, where he spent his youth as a farm boy acquiring an interest in agriculture which has found expression by ownership of a farm all his life and constant interest in the problems of the farm.

His education was received in the public schools of Iowa and Illinois. He attended school at Cleveland and Milan, Ill., and high school at Hopkinton, Iowa. Following high school he attended and was graduated in 1884 from Lenox college at Hopkinton, majoring in a classical course. He continued his education with the study of law in Nebraska, being admitted to the Nebraska bar in 1890.

His public career started immediately after his admission to the bar when he was the successful candidate for county attorney being elected two terms. He later served one term in the state senate of Nebraska. Graham moved with his family to Forest Grove in 1911 where he has since made his residence. In addition to serving in the legislature he served as city attorney for several years, has always been an active member of the Chamber of Commerce and has been a member of the school board.

Graham is a member of the Congregational church, I. O. O. F., Modern Woodmen, Grange and A. F. & A. M., 32nd degree Mason. He was a member of the committee of the Masonic and Eastern Star home located at Forest Grove, for ten years, being chairman for two years.

FORMER PASTOR OF GLENCELEN CHURCH RECOVERING

MAYOR AND COUNCIL OPPOSE ISSUING MORE BONDS AGAINST TOWN

A called meeting of the Town Council on November 27, was called to order by Mayor Fisher.

A roll call showed the following present: Councilmen Barnes, Bishop, Boswell, Fordney and Koshland; Mayor Fisher, Town Attorney Reimer, Recorder-Treasurer Wilson, and Chief of Police Peets. Absent: Councilman Livermore. Mr. Livermore came in after roll call. Quorum present.

The minutes of the meeting of November 20, 1933, were read and approved as read.

Resolution No. 15 was referred to Councilman Boswell, Chairman of the Committee on Resolutions, who recommended passage of the resolution. Motion by Boswell seconded by Fordney that Resolution No. 15 be passed. The vote was Ayes: 6—Barnes, Bishop, Boswell, Fordney, Koshland, Livermore. Nays None.

COUNCIL RESOLUTION NO. 15
Introduced by Councilman Fordney and read Nov. 27, 1933.

Policy of Mayor and Council in Regard to Cost of Proposed New Sewer System

WHEREAS, the Town Council and Mayor have had under consideration of late, the proposition of installing a Sewer System in Beaverton and WHEREAS, Mr. Burton V. Palmer, Executive Secretary of the State Advisory Board, submitted a plan to the Town Council whereby the proposed Sewer System would be financed under a Federal NIRA loan, thirty per cent outright grant, and the balance to be paid within thirty years at 4% interest, and

WHEREAS, when the engineers' report was submitted to the Town Council, the plan of financing had been altered, and part of the cost of said proposed Sewer shall be defrayed by issuing General Obligation Bonds for payment of same.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE PEOPLE OF THE TOWN OF BEAVERTON

that the Mayor and the Town Council of the Town of Beaverton do hereby go on record as being opposed to constructing said proposed Sewer System by issuing General Obligation Bonds for payment of same.

The Recorder was instructed to answer the recent letter from the Student Body of Beaverton High school thanking them for the interest they have shown and for their cooperation in keeping the streets of the Town clean.

Motion by Bishop seconded by Livermore, that the request of the Municipal Service Bureau for a statement of the Town Council's attitude in regard to regulation of the sale of liquor in excess of 14% of Alcohol by volume, by State owned dispensaries or by private stores under municipal license, be placed on file and no action taken.

Motion by Koshland seconded by Fordney that the Legislative assessment of (\$5) five dollars, to the League of Oregon Cities be allowed and a warrant issued for the same.

Motion by Bishop seconded by Barnes that the Recorder be authorized to write to Senators McAlae and Ireland recommending the passage by the State Legislature of House Bill No. 40, providing for refunds of State Motor Vehicle Fuel Taxes paid by municipalities.

Motion by Fordney seconded by Koshland that Senate Bill No. 39 be laid on the table.

The committee consisting of Bishop, Koshland and Livermore, appointed to lay out the work for the CWA project made their report. A general discussion followed and it was understood that the members of the committee were to use their own judgment within reason in purchasing necessary supplies for the work.

Motion by Bishop seconded by Koshland, that the Recorder be authorized to order 500 official and 500 sample ballots for the Town election to be held on Dec. 5, 1933.

The Recorder was instructed to write Jerome Walters and demand action on the matter of a sidewalk in front of their property on Watson street before the next regular council meeting.

Motion by Livermore seconded by Barnes that a warrant for \$1425 cents be drawn to reimburse the petty cash fund for expenditures to Nov. 27, 1933.

Liquor Legislation Holds Interest at Salem

The House Alcoholic Control Committee is rapidly whipping the Knox bill into shape for presentation to the House before the end of the week. The committee has been holding late night sessions in an attempt to prepare a bill which will meet with the general approval of the public.

By unanimous vote the committee approved the principles of the Knox plan. Indications are, however, that a minority report will be filed by Representatives from Multnomah County who request that hard liquors be sold at hotels and in restaurants with meals.

Under the bill, as amended, the state will establish liquor stores in the larger cities and will probably authorize druggists or other mercantile establishments to be the agents of the state in the sale of hard liquors in original packages.

The committee has unanimously adhered to the bill which provides that all profits from the sale of hard liquors in the state of Oregon shall go to the state.

The bill includes provision prohibiting the sale on Sundays and holidays and sale to minors. It also authorizes the Commission to determine the location where liquor may be sold. This provision will enable citizens to file protests with the commission in the event the sale of liquor is made near schools or churches. Indications are that the committee bill will meet strenuous opposition by those opposed to state control and by those interested in private profits from the sale of liquors.

Representative J. O. Johnson, of Tigard, is chairman of the alcoholic control committee.

Christmas mail for foreign countries should be posted early in order to make the correct sailings from the Atlantic and Pacific coast to its destination. John M. Jones, postmaster, Portland, has announced. Packages which are ready should be posted at once, lest changes in steamship schedules or congestion prevent delivery until after Christmas, he said.
