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COUNCIL HOLD UP SEWER PROJECT FOR INVESTIGATION

Regular meeting of the Town Council was held Monday, December 4th.

Mr. Forrester of Forrester and Lewis made a proposal to the Council as follows: For and in consideration of your moral and political support and assistance of your Town Attorney, Forrester and Lewis, licensed engineers of Portland, Oregon, will make your survey and prepare plans and specifications for submission to the United States Government for PWA funds to construct a sewage system and purification plant in Beaverton, Oregon. In the event this is refused either by the government or by the people in election, the Town of Beaverton will not be liable for any services of Forrester and Lewis. In the event the project of sewers and plant is consummated, then Forrester and Lewis will be paid from such funds, provided, at the rate as based on rates recommended by the American Society of Civil Engineers. Said rate not to exceed 10% of project.

Dr. Watts, Roy Davis and Bruce Davis appeared before the Council with a proposition in which the Town would lease the Watts Airport and improve it by means of CWA funds. Mayor Fisher appointed the Council as a committee of the whole to take up the matter further.

Motion by Livermore seconded by Barnes that the proposition of Forrester and Lewis be placed on file for further investigation before any definite action is taken on it.

Dr. Talbert, of the school board appeared before the Council and suggested an extension of Cedar street from Front street to Second street in front of the High School as a possible CWA project. The request was referred to the committee on the CWA project.

The Recorder was instructed to write a letter to Meier and Frank requesting aid on the furnishing of tile in front of their property which is used as a drain from the school building.

Motion by Bishop seconded by Fordney that the Recorder apply to the County Court for a contract for the Town to collect dog licenses.

Motion by Barnes seconded by Livermore, that the matter of amending Ordinances No. 2 and 13, traffic ordinances, be laid on the table. The vote was: Yeas, 4; Barnes, Bishop, Koshland, Livermore, Nays, 2, Boswell and Fordney.

Motion by Bishop seconded by Barnes that the communication from the State Highway Dept. in regard to Beaverton's share of the cost of construction of the new Tualatin Valley Highway thru the Town, be laid on the table.

The Recorder was instructed to collect for tile laid for which individuals owe the Town.

Motion by Fordney seconded by Koshland that the Town Hall be painted as a CWA project.

The matter of correction of the lien docket as a CWA project was taken under advisement.

Claims against the Town were referred to the finance committee. Motion by Livermore, seconded by Barnes that the following claims be allowed and warrants drawn for the same as funds are available.

Data Given on \$75,000 Sewage Project by PWA Engineer for State

State Engineer C. C. Hockley answers a number of confusing questions regarding \$75,000 proposed sewer project.

Q. Can the Federal Loan be financed on a Revenue Bond based on service charges?

A. The Public Works Administration Act authorizes loans to public bodies on revenue bond basis.

Revenue bonds are of course self-liquidating type of security but finances in Oregon are so bad in many cases, that revenue bonds have been refused.

I have not considered this Beaverton District, but will be glad to receive any application on the revenue bond basis and am giving you this information in order that you may be sure the loan is well justified.

Q. This will not be in the nature of a general obligation bond?

A. Revenue bonds which will liquidate by fees are not general obligation bonds.

Q. Will this be at 4% over a period of thirty years?

A. Thirty year period is satisfactory and the rate will be 4%.

Q. Can we rely on a 30% grant?

A. Public bodies are entitled to a grant of 30% of labor and material, not 30% of the total cost.

Q. What is the latest date we may have our application in?

A. Washington has asked to have all applications in Washington by January first.

We should have a week if possible in this office as we know that many interpret this to mean January first, as the date which will allow mailing from this office, but would give us no time for consideration of the project.

Q. Can CWA work be used on this project?

A. Civil Works Administration work cannot be used on this project.

Local Health Officers Report to Council on Unsanitary Condition

Following is the report of Health Officers Welsh and Mason, in regard to open ditch from the Grange Hall to Beaverton and Tualatin river.

"At request of Mayor Fisher we have investigated the open sewer outlined on attached slip. We find the contents in this open ditch to be very foul and offensive. We find the contaminated water is being used for irrigation purposes and consider conditions as we find them very unsanitary and a menace to the health of the community. We have been informed that this drainage is from the Grange hall and that no septic tank exists between said hall and open ditch. We therefore recommend that this matter be given your immediate attention and a septic tank ordered installed if none exists. If this unsatisfactory condition is not promptly dealt with we will have no choice but to bring this matter to the attention of the State Health Department.
