HISTORY OF SCOUTING

Cubbing, VI

The "Cubs" is a leisure-time, character influencing movement for boys of pre-Scout age—boys 9, 10 and 11 years.

It does not aim to draw a boy away from his home for his good times, but seeks definitely to multiply the ways in which a boy may find joy in his own neighborhood and back yard.

Young boys join what are called "dens" and these are part of "packs." He is taught by means of games and their testwork "honors"—respect for the flag, care of the body, stunts, homework, handicraft, collecting, scrap-books, knotwork and hobbies. No parallel with scouting is recognized.

Cubbing is still somewhat experimental although it was devised back East, through scientific means. In Portland it has been applied only a little, but perhaps will be more general within a year.

VII Last Years

In 1931 the net registration work passed 900,000, and the grand total for membership in the organization since its inception was over five and one half million.

Regarding the advancement of scouts in the country last year, about 610,000 merit badges were awarded and over 9,000 boys became Eagle scouts. There were 400,000 boys in camp that summer—nearly half of all the scouts 18,000 learned to swim. Over 70 medals and certificates for heroic life saving were awarded.

Every year these impressive figures are challenged by the new years accomplishments. We believe the movement is permanent.

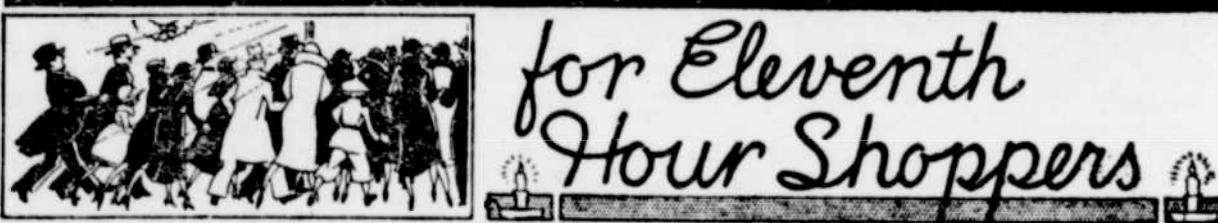
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
