## 4-H CORN-HOG CONTESTS TO BE HELD AT 1934 P. I.

Announcement that 4-H club boys and girls may begin planning now with definite assurance that the Portland Union Stock Yards pig feeding and corn growing contests will be sponsored at the Pacific International Livestock exposition in Portland again in 1934 was made during the 4-H club hour over KOAC recently by George A. Pierson, president of that company.

Each year for several years the sum of \$1,075 for the pig feeding contest and \$450 for the corn growing contest, a total of \$1,525, has been awarded to club members at the Pacific International by the Portland Union Stock Yards company. Each year interest has been greater, the number of entries higher, and the quality of exhibits better, Mr. Pierson says. Announcement of next year's contest was made early so that clubbers might get off to a good start.

## ALL TIME TO OREGON

William M. Briggs, formerly city attorney of Ashland and now consultant on public works administration projects, will henceforth devote all his time to aiding municipalities in Oregon. When first appointed to this position, Mr. Briggs was commissioned to aid cities in Washington also, but that state will have an appointee of its own.

Mr. Briggs was appointed to his position in this state by the American Municipal Association, which is financing the advisory work through some 25 offices scattered all over the United States.

Cities desiring the aid of Mr. Briggs may communicate with him thru the office of the League of Oregon Cities on the campus of the University of Oregon.

## Sudan Grass Finds Favor

## DIRECTIONS FOR MAKING ELECTRIC BROODER READY

Plans and specifications of a practical home made electric brooder may be had free from the agricultural engineering department of Oregon State college. This brooder was designed by experiment station workers in answer to a demand from the poultrymen who wished to take advantage of electric heat but felt that they could not purchase the many good commercial brooders on the market.

Three of these home made brooders were used on the college farm last spring and gave excellent results at moderate cost, reports F. E. Price, who designed the brooder. Mortality ranged from 4.7 to 6 per cent for the six weeks period.

These brooders are constructed on a different principle than the usual commercial brooder, using bottom heat. The framework is mostly wood, while screen used for the floor of the brooder.

## HISTORY OF SCOUTING

The organization of the scout troop hinges upon the scoutmaster (SM). In a new troop a group of citizens forms the committee, which choose the SM. Aiding the leaders are helpers called assistant scoutmasters (ASM). All of these leaders are called scouts and receive their commission from the national office in New York.

Junior leaders in a troop relieve the adult leaders of detail, etc., and act as go-betweens between scouts and scouters. These start with the patrol organization, having a patrol leader (PL) and his assistant (APL). At the head of the group of patrols is the senior patrol leader (SPL). Finally there is the older boy leader called the junior assistant scoutmaster. Of course the troop has a secretary (called scribe) and an equipment caretaker (called quartermaster). Back of the troop is generally an institution which sponsors it, backing it in all the activities. It affords the troop meeting place, leadership and cooperation.

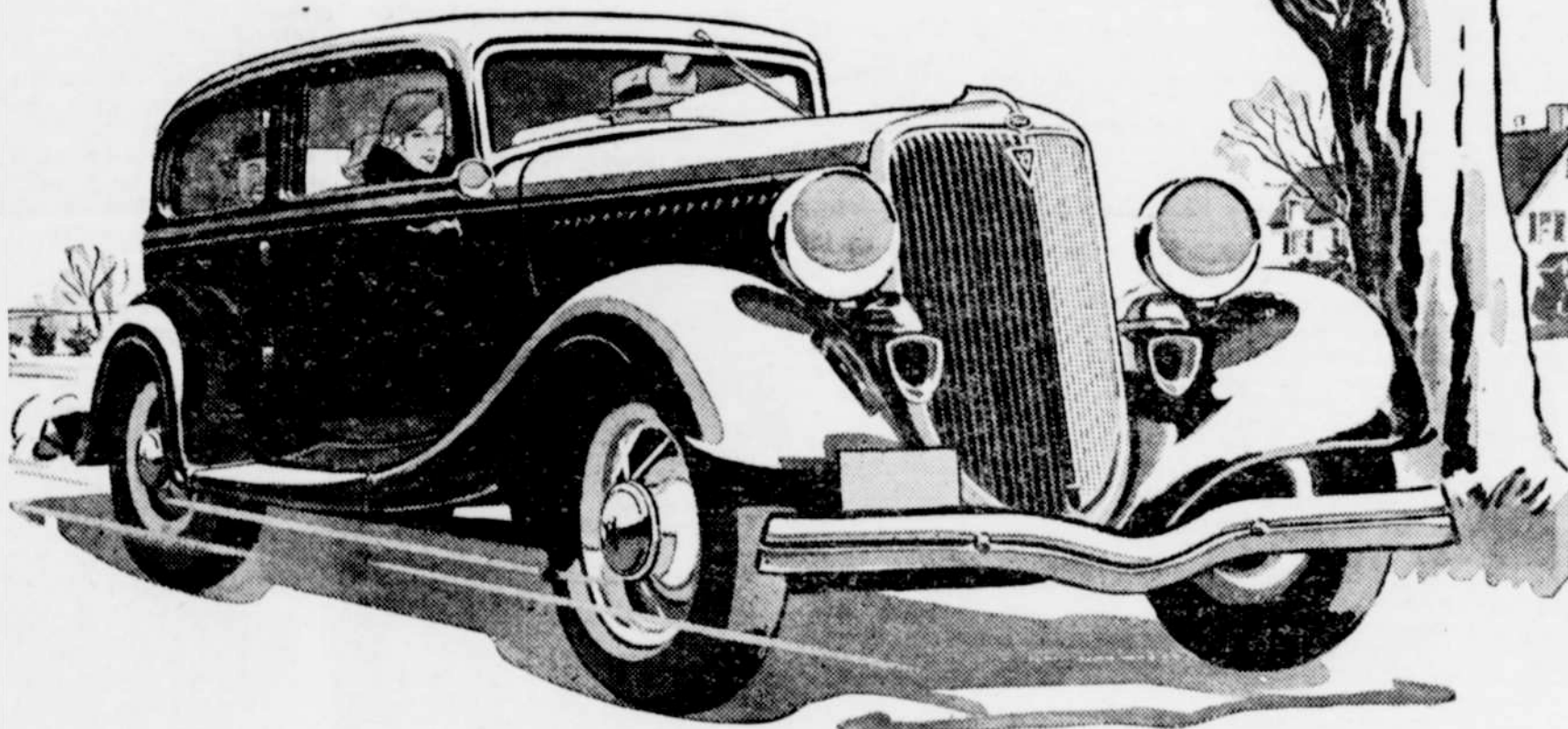
