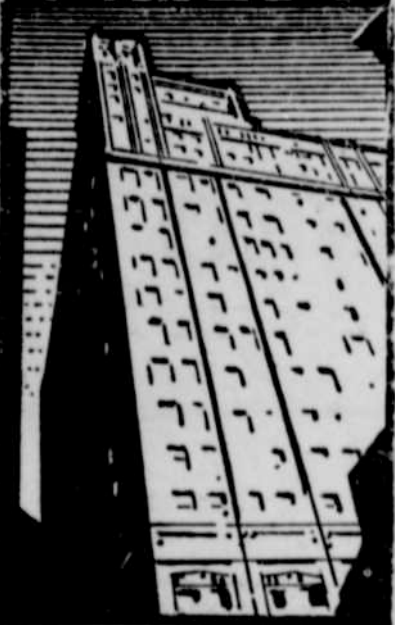
Mr. and Mrs. Will Keller of Portland visited the Joe Keller home Thursday.

AUTO AND BUS CRASH

Man and Son Injured When Machine Skids Into Stage

Crashing head-on with an Oregon Stages bus on the Capitol highway, one-half mile north of Multnomah, Fred Prettyman and his son John of Tigard, were injured Saturday night and taken by the ambulance to the Multnomah county hospital.

Injuries to Mr. Prettyman included a possible skull fracture, scalp lacerations and internal injuries. His son, who later was transferred to the

Doernbecher Memorial hospital, received severe abrasions.

Mr. Prettyman's automobile skidded into the pathway of the bus, according to Deputy Sheriff Loll. After the crash the car swerved from the highway and dived down a ten-foot embankment.
