EXTENSION SERVICE TO AID FARMERS IN HOG ORGANIZATION PLAN

Now that the five regional Oregon conferences on the corn-hog adjustment plan have been held, county agents are preparing to launch the educational and organization campaign in every county where they are now maintained.

The preliminary board of review for Oregon has been appointed already by Paul V. Maris, director of the Oregon State college extension service, which is again charged with the task of explaining the plan to Oregon farmers and helping them organize to obtain its benefits. This board, headed by L. R. Beethaupt, extension economist, has announced that organizations will be allowed in every county even though only a few growers qualify for the benefit payments.

No provision has been made by the AAA for hiring emergency agents in this campaign for counties in Oregon that maintain no regular county agents, hence farmers in such counties will be put to more trouble in setting up their organizations. The extension service is offering to supply information and give any aid possible to farmers from these counties that can come to Corvallis for such help. A somewhat similar situation is foreseen with the coming dairy adjustment program.

Estimates sent out from Washington place the possible corn benefit payments at \$750,000. This compares with \$2,777,000 which will come to this state from the first year's operation of the wheat adjustment plan.

Definite announcement has now been made that application of a production control plan to dairy products is imminent, details of which may be announced from Washington any day. Just what form it will take is still uncertain, but the December break in butter prices, coupled with the steadily mounting surplus was followed by announcement from Secretary Wallace that a production control plan will be launched almost immediately.

Conferences on the dairy situation have marked the holiday period, at one of which the possibility of combining the dairy program with similar aid for the beef producers was considered, as both industries are in serious economic conditions at present. Livestock are expected to be added to the basic commodity list in the farm act at the forthcoming session of congress.

Announcement of a pending dairy control plan follows a change in the head of the dairy section of the AAA. J. H. Mason, general manager of the Des Moines Cooperative Dairy Marketing association, succeeds Dr. Clyde L. King in this position.

A later significant development is that the big Chicago milk marketing agreement, the first one completed under the AAA last summer, has been abandoned at the request of 75 per cent of those included in it. This failure is believed to have strengthened determination of the AAA officials to launch dairy production control at once.

Three More Banks Pay Dividends on Restricted Deposits this Week

The state banking board announced Wednesday the release of another 5% in the commercial deposits of the Multnomah Commercial and Savings Bank. The Troutdale State Bank will also release in both the commercial and savings deposits another 5%.

Cornelius State bank, which went into liquidation April 3, after 60 per cent of the deposits were turned over to the Commercial National Bank of Hillsboro, has declared a 15 per cent dividend on the balance.

Production Program for Dairying Discussed

Some kind of dairy production control program is being developed by the Agricultural Adjustment Administration made as to just what form this traction. No announcements have yet taken. Washington county dairy farmers should be interested in the following comment taken from the weekly News Digest issued by the A. A. A. at Washington.

"Good prices for dairy farmers must be based on achieving a proper balance between production and consumer demand," Secretary Wallace said in a statement issued December 21. It is the Secretary's position that the powers of the Government under the Agricultural Adjustment Act should be used to lift farm prices and not distributors prices. The present issue in the dairy industry is whether a fair share of returns should go to the dairy farmers or whether a good deal of the cream of profits taken from producers and consumers should go to a few companies distributing milk. "Good prices for dairy farmers must be based upon achieving a proper balance - between production and consumer demand. If this balance is attained through a dairy production adjustment program and is not upset by unreasonable resale prices charged by distributors in milk sheds, farmers will get their fair share of returns to the industry. I am going to invite the dairy farmers of this country to join us in working out and carrying through a real dairy production adjustment program. We will fight to maintain reasonable fluid prices to farmers in the milk sheds. If, and when, such prices are supported by fair and reasonable prices to butter and cheese producers prosperity will return to the whole dairy industry."

Possibility of Growing Flax in County Arouses Interest Among Farmers

Flax for fiber is a crop possibility that is arousing some interest among farmers of the county. Every year there is some inquiry but with the recent publicity about the possibility of the federal government putting a large sum of money into the flax industry in this state many are making inquiry about growing the crop. Flax straw is rather bulky and cannot economically be transported long distances to retting and scutching plants. If federal assistance should be given and the plants established not too far away to handle the straw then fiber flax growing apparently offers considerable promise to growers in this section. Until provision is made for providing the necessary facilities for handling the crop it is hardly something to spend much time with.

Considerable work has been done at the Oregon Experiment Station in the past several years with fiber flax, reports George R. Hyslop, of the farm crops department. Among other things they have established the fact that it is not necessary to go to some foreign country every three years to get good seed. American grown seed has proven just as good or better than much that was imported, according to Hyslop. Drilling, as a method of seeding, has proven more desirable than broadcasting, as a more uniform quality of fiber is produced in this way and on finely pulverized and firm seed bed the amount of seed required is less.

Early planting is essential to success. This means that fiber flax is not a wet land crop as it would rarely be possible to get the crop in until after the middle of April. Generally, planting not later than the last of March, or the first of April gives better results. Long, uniform straw is desirable and essential if the crop is to be profitable. This means rather early planting on a firm seed bed. Most any of the soils that grow good crops of fall grain in Washington county will grow a satisfactory crop of flax when properly handled. On land that has been cropped to grain for years and where the grain crops are rather low yielding the flax will probably not be profitable. The better yields result from planting on good soils which hold moisture rather well.

Hog Raisers Meeting at Hillsboro Today, Jan. 5

These and many other questions will be answered at a meeting at the Chamber of Commerce in Hillsboro, Friday, Jan. 5, at 1:30 p. m. A representative of the Extension Service from Corvallis will be present to explain details of the Corn-Hog Reduction Plan and to answer any questions which may come up. Any farmer who has farrowed an average of at least 3 litters a year for 1932 and 1933 will be vitally interested in attending this meeting.
