HISTORY OF SCOUTING

(X Sea Scouting)

Sea Scouting is a man's job given to older boys. Scout work up from "apprentice" sea scout to the rank of "quartermaster" through a series of requirements on such subjects as knots, boat drills, parts of boats, etc. He has passed twenty such requirements when he is "ordinary," fifteen more for "able" rank and a total of fifty for the highest rank, "quartermaster."

Sea scouts wear a distinctive blue uniform with sufficient insignia so that any scout can recognize the rank and achievements of that scout.

Members of ship or patrol become expert watermen and boatmen, and are really seafaring young men before they reach the top.

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FORTY-TWO MEN EMPLOYED ON WHEELER AVE. PROJECT

Approximately forty-two men are employed on the extension of Wheeler avenue under the CWA plan, which involves the expenditure of around \$9000. It is expected the project will be completed the middle of February.

When finished this new roadway will be the longest road in the county running north and south. The road commences at Cooper Mt. and extends to Cornelius Pass, directly to the Columbia highway. Two bridges and several fills will have to be constructed to make the connection. The road opens a large tract of land close by adjacent to the Aloha district. Five other roads are crossed by the new highway, the Baseline, Walker, Cornell, Germantown and Cornelius Pass

Information Available

On New Truck and Bus Bill

Complete information as to the operation of vehicles, under the new truck and bus bill may be obtained at the office of Leonard Adams in Beaverton. He is prepared to clear up problems that are confronting the operators, such as the definitions of the five classifications, also to specify under which of these the driver is to operate. Application fees, for insurance, bonds, filing requirements and mileage tax will be explained and arrangements made to obtain necessary documents as required by the new law.

The five classes of vehicle carriers are:

1. Common carrier, fixed terminal, freight and passenger and anywhere for hire, freight or passenger.
2. Contract carrier—one who hauls under special agreement.
3. Private carrier—transporting of property or merchandise belong to carrier.
4. Special carrier—transporting logs, spiling, poles, rough timber, hauling wood of any description, sand or gravel used exclusively in highway or construction work.
5. Exempt class—all private carriers having combined weight of vehicle and load of not more than 4,000 lbs; school busses, rural mail carriers under contract with government 1½ ton farm trucks used by owners to transport farm products, towing and wrecking cars.
