Washington county farmers will soon be seeding red clover. Some of them who have signed wheat allotment contracts are wondering just how this wheat deal affects their usual seeding of clover. There is nothing in the contract placing any restriction on the seeding of red clover on the wheat just as they have been in the habit of doing. Where the contracted acreage is part of the same field it is usually desirable to get the entire field seeded down to clover for the next crop. This may be done by seeding the clover on the wheat as usual and then seeding clover alone during late spring on the land taken out of wheat.

Contracted wheat acreage seeded to red clover or alfalfa will of course be acceptable as the contracted acreage only for the year in which the clover or alfalfa was seeded. Another area will need to be designated the contracted acreage for the following year. Every applicant for wheat allotment received, during early October, a copy of the rules regarding the use of the contracted acreage. If there is any doubt in the mind of anyone he should look up these regulations.

What did the 5,366 callers at the county agent office during 1933 want? That question might be answered quickly by glancing through the brief summary of the work for the year just recently completed. This indicates that approximately 1900 of these callers were about equally divided between information about forage crops and horticulture. It might be supposed that emergency crop loans and agricultural adjustment inquiries made up a large part of this number but such is not the case as these two subjects combined accounted for only a little over 400 callers. The other odd 3900 were divided between about 17 agricultural enterprises represented in Washington county farming, with soils, farm management, junior projects, marketing, dairy, poultry and general farm crops leading the others in about the order mentioned.

In between times, 1482 farm calls were made and 139 meetings were held. The latter figure does not represent those meetings attended and participated in but included only those which were held for the purpose of presenting information regarding some farm enterprise of the county.
