HISTORY OF SCOUTING

XIII (Camp Meriwether)

The Portland Area Council has for nearly a decade run the summer camp "Meriwether" named in honor of Meriwether Lewis of the Lewis and Clark Expedition. The camp is located on a lake and fronts on the ocean near Sand Lake, Oregon.

Camp periods during the summer season are each of two weeks, for which the scouts pay a board fee. New scouts are first taken on a trail ceremony made to cover Lewis and Clark's whole journey, and history and traditions are explained to them.

The program is a variety of events—handicraft, camping and hiking, etc. covering a host of outdoor activities. The headquarters staff and other leaders chosen by the staff act as camp masters.

At the close of each period scouts who have been satisfactory campers are given cloth emblems with the name of their unit—Rovers, David Douglas, Bunyan, Lookout, Struan, Pirate, Life Guard or Sea Scouts.

Outstanding scouts, perhaps three or four out of about two hundred—receive the camp's highest award, the bronze bar Vi Et Consilio.

Correspondence

Enthusiasm as to the glory of promoting health and vitality and reducing days of pain and illness sometimes so occupy our thoughts that the plain facts of what to do, what not to do, and when to do it, are submerged or drift away from our memories.

Time and again it has been shown that knowledge of what to do and courage to give immediate help in the case of sudden illness or accident in the short time before a doctor can be called; may be the means of saving life or preventing untold suffering and needless loss of time and money.

Let us list from the American Red Cross Text a few reminders: "Serious bleeding, stoppage of breathing, and poisoning take precedent over everything else. What is serious bleeding depends upon the effect upon the person who is injured, but in any event it should be stopped with all haste and every individual would do well to learn the exact location of "pressure points." By means of these it is possible to shut off the blood supply to the injured part and so stop bleeding. Even before mentioning it let us caution against the abuse of the tourniquet! Never should it be left in place longer than fifteen minutes consecutively. In general it may be said that there are spots on the human frame work where a blood vessel may be shoved against a bone and the opening closed much as one would shut off a garden hose by stepping upon it.

The following may help as a method of locating these spots.

1. On the inner side of the upper arm about where the seam of a coat is found.
2. On the temple where the throb of the pulse may be felt.
3. Directly in front of the ear.

4. In the thigh in a position which corresponds to that in the arm.

5. Behind and under the collar bone, in passing it might be well to know that pressure upon this point for purely experimental purposes might prove painful and is probably unnecessary.

The first aid treatment of the other two types of trouble will at a later time be discussed in this paper.

COUNTY NOT IN POSITION TO PAY FOR FIRE PROTECTION

Commissioner Riley, of Portland, will be the deciding factor, whether or not the Portland fire department goes to the aid of outside communities in case of fire.

Washington county officials propose to put an item in their next year's budget, providing for the expense of such service in the county, but have no funds available for this years expenditure. When Portland firemen make runs outside of Portland, they are on their own, in case of accident.

Outside districts may form fire districts under the state law, which will provide them with this protection.

Depositors to Get \$5000

Glendale Or., Jan. 19—(Special)—Nearly \$5000 will be paid in dividends on January 18 to former depositors of the Glendale State bank when the state banking department makes its first dividend of 10 per cent on commercial deposits and 20 per cent on savings. The local bank has paid out 10 per cent on commercial accounts and 30 per cent on savings accounts between last March and July, 1933, when its affairs were turned over to the state banking department for liquidation.

EMERGENCY DAIRY FEEDS

DISCUSSED BY O. S. C. MEN

Considerable interest has been shown among dairymen in maintenance rations for dairy cattle. With the low price of butterfat, many dairymen are finding it difficult to buy feedstuffs which are maintaining a fairly high price level. Also, there is a slow demand for milk cows and beef prices are very low. The situation is more difficult in the Willamette valley where practically all of last year's oats and vetch hay crop was destroyed by winter freezing.

It is certainly logical for every dairyman to cull his herd closely at the present time rather than purchase feeds for them. Old cows, poor producers and unhealthy animals such as abortion reactors, difficult breeders, and animals with udder disorders may well be disposed of. Similarly, young heifers may be culled and only the choicest one retained. It would be much more desirable to cull one-fourth or even one-half of the herd.
