Farmers Ask Many Questions

HILLSBORO—What are the principal things on which Washington county farmers seek advice from their county agent. Of the 5366 who called at his office during 1933, about 1000 came to discuss either forage crops or horticulture. About 400 called in regard to the emergency crop loans and agricultural adjustment program, while the other 3900 divided their questions among the 17 other agricultural enterprises represented in Washington county, with soils, farm management, junior projects, marketing, dairy, poultry and general farm crops leading the list. In addition, County Agent Cyrus called on 1492 farmers, and held 139 meetings, for the purpose of presenting information regarding some farm enterprise of the county.

MAY PARTICIPATE IN FARM COST CONTEST

4-H club members in this county may participate in a nation-wide farm cost accounting contest, conducted by the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, according to a notice just received by this newspaper. The prizes numbering several hundred will range from a small Farmall tractor or a light motor truck or a \$500 merchandise certificate down to \$10 merchandise certificates. The national winner will receive prizes valued at \$835.

Contestants may use any record book that provides for an opening and closing inventory, money expended and received, costs of producing principal crops, etc., and a balance sheet. If such record books are not available through county agents, a simple one especially prepared for 4-H members may be obtained from the National Committee on Boys and Girls Club Work, Chicago, Ill., for 20 cents, the actual cost of printing and mailing. The National Committee is conducting the contest in cooperation with the state club leaders.

The books must be opened as of January 1, Feb. 1 or March 1 and cover the 12 consecutive months following. Upon completion the books will be judged by the county agent to determine the county winner who will receive a \$10 merchandise certificate from the International Harvester Company. County winners also have a chance for the state prize which is choice of a 750-lb. capacity cream separator or \$100.00 merchandise certificate. State winners will compete in a sectional contest in which the prize is choice of a complete double unit milker or a \$225 merchandise certificate. The national winner has a choice of a Farmall 12 tractor, a half-ton motor truck, or \$500 merchandise certificate.

Records must be kept in the handwriting of the club member, but he is permitted and encouraged to make use of help from parents and leaders. Contestants will not be required to reveal the contents of their records at any time except through judges, who will keep them confidential.

By interesting parents in the contest it is hoped to increase greatly the practice of keeping records, which in the readjustments now required of agriculture will prove of inestimable aid.

1933 FORD SALES SURPASS THOSE OF PREVIOUS YEARS

Proof that the automobile industry is snapping out of the depression with gusto was offered northwest Ford dealers last night at their regular monthly sales meeting by H. H. Wilcox, Seattle branch manager of the Ford Motor Co. He informed the dealers that 1933 Ford sales records had far outdone those of 1932.

Wilcox, besides being enthusiastic about the national outlook for the coming year, is also cheered over prospects for the new Ford V-8 in 1934. "I anticipate a 75% increase in sales this year over last," he stated, "and so far January figures bear out my contention. We have sold more units in the first ten days of this month than were sold in the entire month of January, 1933."

WHEAT FARMERS GET \$26,977,359

Washington, D. C., Jan. 26—Farmers contracting with the government to reduce wheat acreage have received \$26,977,359 in benefits, the Agricultural Adjustment Administration announced Saturday.

Payments included 362,897 checks sent to growers in 35 states.

Approximately \$70,000,000 will be paid this winter to contracting growers.—Wall Street Journal.

\$300,000,000 NEEDED FOR CCC

HI-WAYS TO HEALTH

THE IMPORTANCE OF CHEESE

To use plenty of cheese is one way to use more milk. Cheese contains the same elements as milk only in different proportions and can be used in ways that milk cannot.

Cheese is not something to season or flavor some other food—a condiment or accessory. Whole-milk cheese is a substantial food in itself, good in a main dish on a meatless day, for example, because it contains many of the same food values as meat, as well as other values. It is rich in protein fat, calcium, and phosphorus and in vitamin A—just as milk is rich in these same elements.

The high food value of cheese, as well as its flavor, makes it a valuable addition to an oven dish, to a cream sauce and to various soups. An onion soup, for instance, made with meat stock, and served with toasted bread on top and grated hard cheese over the toast, makes a delicious and likewise a very nutritious lunch, indeed a very substantial part of any meal.

Because cheese contains so much protein, it should be cooked at a very low temperature. In fact, most dishes should be cooked over water, or in a very slow oven.

Some "different" cheese dishes are:

Tomato Rabbit

2 tablespoons butter
1/2 small onion, chopped
2 tablespoons flour
1/2 pound cheese, shaved thin
Salt and pepper
1 pint canned tomatoes

Cook the onion in the butter for a few minutes and stir in the flour. Gradually add the tomatoes and cook until the mixture thickens. Add the cheese, stir until it melts, and keep the heat very low. Season to taste with salt and pepper and serve at once on crisp toast or crackers.

A quick way to make this rabbit is to use canned tomato soup, instead of tomatoes which must be thickened. In this case brown the onion in a little butter, add the tomato soup, and when hot add the cheese. Stir until the cheese is melted and the mixture smooth. Use a 10-ounce can of soup to 1/2 pound of cheese, or more cheese if desired. This dish is often called "gington diddy."

Scalloped Cabbage, Spaghetti and Cheese

1 1/2 cups spaghetti broken in small pieces
3 tablespoons flour
3 tablespoons butter,
2 cups milk
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 pound American cheese
1 quart shredded cabbage
1 cup buttered bread crumbs
Cook the spaghetti in boiling water for 20 minutes, and drain. Make a sauce of the flour, butter, milk and salt. Shave up the cheese, add to the hot sauce, and stir until melted. Put the cabbage, spaghetti, and sauce in a buttered baking dish in layers and cover the top with buttered bread crumbs. Bake 20 to 30 minutes in a moderate oven.

HOMEMAKERS' QUESTION BOX

Question I

Question—Why are roasts sometimes dry and hard.

Answer—This may be due to the method of cooking. The temperature may have been too hot.

In order that a roast may always be tender and juicy, choose one which is nicely marbled with fat and one which has a generous covering of fat over the outside. Place the roast on a rack in an open roasting pan so that the fat covering is on the top. Then as the fat melts it runs down over the meat and bastes it.

Place the roast in a hot oven only long enough to sear it, then rapidly reduce the temperature to that of a slow oven. It is very important that the roast be cooked at a low temperature for most of the roasting process.

Question II

Question—In broiling, is it necessary to turn steak every few minutes?

Answer—No, it is not necessary to turn the steak more than once if it is placed far enough away from the flame that it will not burn. Place the steak on a rack in a thoroughly preheated broiler oven so that the top of

the steak is about 3 inches from the flame. When the top becomes nicely browned, turn the steak and brown on the other side. When the second side is browned, the steak will be done. Only one turning is needed.

Question III

Question—My boiled beef is always stringy. Is it the cuts I use?

Answer—Any cut of meat may be made tender, and not stringy, if properly cooked. The difficulty probably lies in your method of cooking. Meat should be cooked below the boiling temperature, it should never be boiled for if the high temperature is maintained long enough, the connective tissue of the meat will dissolve, so that the fibres will no longer be held together and will appear stringy. The fibres themselves, however, become toughened by the high temperature.

The cuts used for "cooking in water" are the less-tender ones, since the heat softens the connective tissue. The beef cuts most often used for this method of preparation are the plate, brisket, shank, short ribs, and corned beef.

Question IV

Question—How can one judge when meat is done? The appearance of the meat is a fair guide.

Answer—The appearance is the best guide. When the meat is done, the surface is a bright, almost cherry red. The appearance of being marbled between the muscle fibres (giving it the appearance of the connective tissue and has flecks of fat deposited along the connective tissue) is a fair indication of quality. Beef of high quality has a generous covering of fat.

Breads For Frosty Days

YOU need good filling breads for breakfast these brisk mornings, and also fruit in several forms. Fortunately there are delicious ways to combine them. Here are some recipes which will prove it:

Wholewheat Fruit Bread: Sift together two and a half cups wholewheat flour, four teaspoons baking powder, one teaspoon salt and four tablespoons sugar, and add one well-beaten egg. Add one tablespoon butter, one cup milk and one cup well drained crushed Hawaiian pineapple. Bake in a loaf pan in a slow oven, 350 degrees, for from forty-five to fifty minutes.

Pineapple Half Moons: Cook together until thick the contents of an 8-ounce can of crushed Hawaiian pineapple, one-third cup sugar and a few grains of salt, then cool slightly. Sift together two cups flour, four teaspoons baking powder, one teaspoon salt and one tablespoon sugar, and cut in one-third cup shortening. Add three-fourths cup milk, roll out quite thin and cut in rounds. Put a teaspoonful of the pineapple on each round, fold over and pinch the edges together. Bake in a hot oven, 425 degrees, for twelve minutes. This makes sixteen.

This Is a Honey

Pineapple and Honey Bran Muffins: Sift together one cup flour, four teaspoons baking powder and three-fourths teaspoon salt, and add one and one-quarter cups of bran. Add two well-beaten eggs, one-fourth cup honey, three-fourths cup milk and one tablespoon melted butter. Add one-half cup crushed Hawaiian pineapple after draining the syrup off thoroughly. Bake in muffin tins, 375 degrees, for twenty minutes. This makes twelve muffins.
