Individually the laws will be dealt with in their order. The following are the twelve laws: A scout is—trustworthy, loyal, helpful, friendly, courteous, kind, obedient, cheerful, thrifty, brave, clean and reverent.

Conservation is the preservation and proper use of nature's resources.

1. A scout is Trustworthy. If he were to violate his honor by telling a lie or by not doing exactly a given task when trusted upon his honor, he may be directed to hand over his scout badge.

It is noteworthy to those interested in conservation that if this law were applied when the public woods are entrusted to any visitor, there would be none of the numerous accidents blamed to carelessness nor vandalism.

If the whole public had this law in mind would not our rare flowers—our delicate shrubbery—our frail wild fowl, be secure?

Fish Allotment to County

The following allocation of fish has been made to Washington county: Necanicum Hatchery 300,000 cutthroat, Scroggins Creek 15,000 Loch Leven, Tualatin River 15,000 Loch Leven. Last season's allocations were as follows: 65,000 East Fork Dairy Creek, 20,000 West Fork, 65,000 Gales Creek, 45,000 McKay Creek, 25,000 Patton Creek, 65,000 Scroggins Creek, 40,000 Tualatin River.
