Stainless Steel Rings

Developed Trade Boom

Girls who caused the discovery of the secret of making stainless steel pliable started a trade boom in Sheffield, England.

Thousands of pounds were spent trying to make stainless steel into ash trays, saucepans, window frames, ink stands, tea trays and a thousand and one domestic articles.

Every attempt failed because the workers could not find the secret of making the steel pliable and at the same time retain its stainless and rustless qualities.

One day a young stainless steel worker conceived the idea of making a steel ring for his girl. When finished it looked like platinum.

Other girls saw the ring and demanded similar ones, and their boys had to work overtime to make rings. The secret of manipulating the steel was told to the owner of the firm, who carried out his own experiments.

From rings developed beer vats, doorsteps, steamship fittings, milk carriers, water taps and other domestic necessities.

Bittersweet a Woody Vine

Bittersweet is a woody vine which twines itself around fences, shrubs and old stone walls. It also likes to climb trees and sometimes may be found waving its bright berries tantalizingly from the ground. The berries are unusually pretty because they have two brilliant colors, the orange of the outer covering which cracks open and curls back in three divisions, and the scarlet of the berry inside. Put them in a vase or jar in the house and they keep their coloring all winter and will not drop off like other berries. Against the snow its colors are particularly vivid and it is fun to gather it then when everything else is gone. The flowers of the bittersweet are greenish-white, growing in loose clusters. They bloom in June, but because they are so tiny we seldom notice them. The leaves are smooth and oblong, finely toothed on the edges, and grow alternately on twisting stem. The climbing bittersweet should not be confused with nightshade, which is also called bittersweet. The plants have no resemblance except in name.

Leaves Catch Light Rays

The reason some trees can grow in shade while others will die unless exposed to the direct rays of the sun is revealed by experts of the New York State college of forestry, Syracuse university, who point out that shade-enduring trees, such as the hemlock, have a great many more leaves than light-loving trees like the pine. All trees need light, but the shade-enduring tree requires less comparatively of each leaf than others, making up the loss by putting out more leaves, each of which acts as a tiny trap to catch rays which filter through the taller trees of the forest.—Literary Digest.

TASTY MEALS ARE IMPORTANT

The importance of appetizing meals can scarcely be over emphasized. Tasty, satisfying food is essential to the contentment and efficiency of every member of the family. There is a growing appreciation of the fact that the use of recommended quantities of dairy products improves the quality of all meals. Milk to drink and milk and butter in food are important in making the diet palatable as well as safeguarding its nutritional value.

One of the best ways of using milk is to drink it. It is one of the few foods which requires no preparation. Served as a beverage, it becomes an additional dish in the meal. As a rule children and adults enjoy drinking milk, and will drink more when it is available. Try putting the pitcher of milk on the table and filling the glasses as they become empty. In families where this plan has been tried all have enjoyed the flavor of the milk and have finished their meals with a well-fed feeling.

In homes where parents drink milk regularly, there is seldom any question about the children continuing the habit. Any indication from a parent that he regards milk as a "baby food" may spoil a good habit in any boy or girl. A few dishes that make a better meal are:

Corn Meal Souffle

2 cups milk
1-3 cup corn meal
3 tbsps. butter
Pepper
2 eggs
Salt
1/2 cup grated cheese
Scald milk, stir in corn meal gradually, and cook twenty minutes in a double boiler. Add butter, grated cheese, and salt and pepper to taste. Separate eggs, beat yolks until light and whites until stiff. Add yolks of first mixture and blend thoroughly. Fold in whites. Bake in buttered baking dish in moderate oven. Time in oven 45 minutes. Temperature 325 deg.

Apple Oatmeal Pudding

4 small apples (cut in eighths)
1/2 cup brown sugar
1/4 tsp cinnamon
1-3 cup butter
1/4 cup sugar
1 egg
1/2 tsp vanilla
1/4 tsp salt
1/2 cup milk
1/2 cup rolled oats
1/2 cup flour
2 tsp baking powder
Arrange apples in bottom of greased dish. Sprinkle with brown sugar and cinnamon. Cream sugar and butter, add well-beaten eggs and vanilla. Beat well. Add milk alternately with oats and flour, baking powder and salt mixture. Pour over apples and bake in a 350 degree oven for 40 minutes.

Prune Cream Pudding

2 cups milk
3 tbsps flour
1 tbsps butter
1 cup sugar
1 tbsps molasses
1 tsp salt
1/2 cup chopped prunes.
Mix sugar, flour and salt. Scald milk. Add gradually to dry ingredients, stirring until smooth. Reheat, cooking slowly until mixture thickens. Add prunes, and turn into a dish to cool.

SUGGEST HIGH TEA

FOR ST. PATRICK'S

Since Saint Patrick's Day comes on Saturday this year why not serve high tea? This sounds like an elaborate celebration but quite the contrary is true—it is a hospitable, informal meal, very much like a buffet supper served between five and six o'clock.

Since a high tea is a combination of luncheon, tea and early dinner, all sorts of liberties may be taken with the menu. Here is a menu, suggested by Inez S. Wilson, home economist.

St. Patrick's Day Menu

Assorted Hors d'Oeuvres
Broiled "Frenched" Lamb Chops

Boiled Rice

Green Peas
Jellied Cucumber Salad
Clover-leaf Rolls
Butter
Greengage Ice Cream
Coffee

Large stuffed olives wrapped in thin slices of bacon fastened on with a toothpick and placed under the broiler flames just long enough to cook the bacon make excellent appetizers.

Chipped beef, cut fine with sciss-sors, and mixed with mayonnaise and seasoned with a dash of cayenne may be piled on crisp crackers.

Thin slices of ham or the various ready to serve sausages cut in fancy shapes may be served as hors d'Oeuvres.

Broiled "Frenched" Lamb Chops

Have the lamb chops cut about 1 inch thick, also have them frenched at the market; that is have the meat removed from the ends of the rib bones. Thoroughly preheat the broiler oven with the oven regulator as high as possible. Put the chops on the broiler rack, placed so that there is a distance of about 3 1/2 inches between the top of the chops and the flame. Broil with the oven door open. When the chops are nicely browned on one side, season with salt and pepper and then turn and brown on the other. When the second side is nicely browned, the chop will be done. Slip a paper ferrule over the ends of the rib bones, and serve on a bed of boiled rice, sprinkled with chopped parsley.



Tomatoes and Eggs

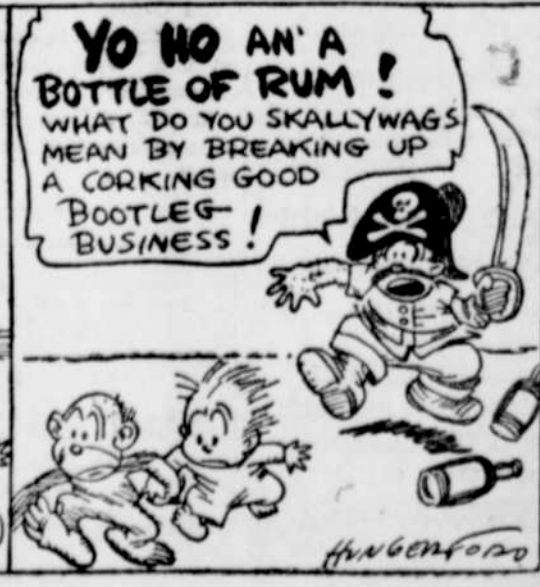
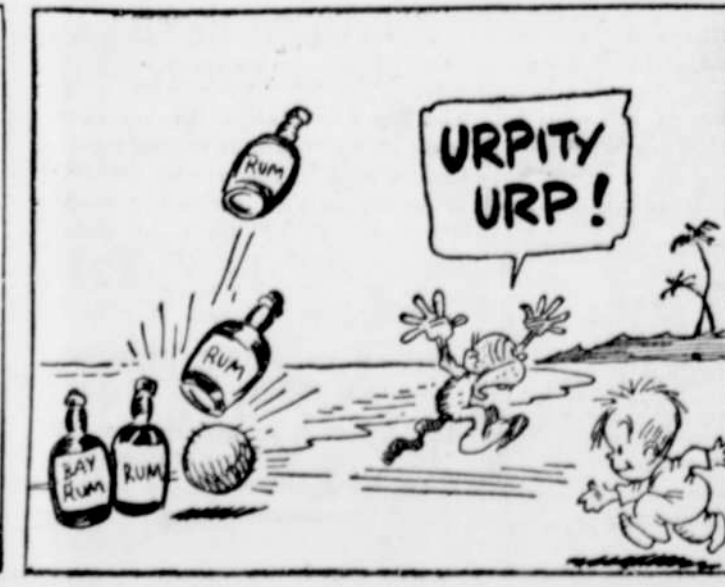
WHEN you put eggs with tomatoes, you get the glorious Spanish colors—yellow and red. But you get more than that, you get a combination of tastes which will titillate your tongue. Here are a couple of ways in which you can demonstrate this to yourself conclusively.

Baked Eggs en Casserole: Sauté one small diced onion in four tablespoons butter for a few minutes, then add three tablespoons flour, and stir smooth. Add the contents of a No. 2 can of tomatoes and cook until thick and creamy. Add one teaspoon salt and enough pepper and paprika to season. Hard-cook four eggs, peel and cut in halves. Put a little of the sauce in each of four individual baking dishes, lay two half eggs in each, and cover with the remaining sauce. Mix one-fourth cup crumbs with three tablespoons grated cheese, and sprinkle over the top. Bake until brown. Serves four.

This is Worth the Trouble
Stuffed Eggs in Hiding: Hard-cook six small eggs, peel, cut in halves, remove yolks, mash and season with salt, paprika, mustard, lemon juice and mayonnaise. Refill whites and press two halves together with one canned anchovy curl in the center of each. Soften one tablespoon gelatin in two tablespoons cold water, and dissolve in boiling tomato juice from a 15-ounce can. Season to taste with salt, pepper, and Worcestershire sauce. Chill, and pour a little in the bottoms of six small molds. When hard, put a filled egg in each mold, and pour around the rest of the tomato juice. Chill until set. Unmold onto lettuce leaves, and garnish with mayonnaise. Serves six.
