FLAVOR IS IMPORTANT

A famous chef says, "Good food need not be expensive. An extra pound of butter a week, judiciously used, could transform most meals into something like a series of domestic miracles. Actually inexpensive food can be the best."

Butter adds to dishes a flavor which can be obtained in no other way. Tasty dishes prepared with butter, through their appeal to the appetite invite most favorable conditions for digestion.

When you have a limited amount of butter, use it in such a way that its unusual flavor dominates the food with which it is served. The delicate flavor of butter is strengthened when used on such bland foods as bread, potato, and other vegetables. The smaller amount of butter used the more important it is that its presence be apparent and that the enjoyment of the dish be traceable to the butter.

Butterfat is not only the equivalent in energy value of other food but is the only food that contains any considerable amount of vitamins. Butterfat is an excellent source of vitamin A and contains some vitamin D. Vitamin A is essential to growth and reproduction and is necessary to the positive health and vigor of adults and children alike. Vitamin A aids in building a health reserve in the body.

At this particular season of the year, children and grown-ups as well are enjoying hot cross buns. It is not difficult to make these favorite sweet rolls but it must be remembered that they depend upon butter, sugar and spice to make them appetizing. A recipe follows:

Hot Cross Buns

1 pint milk scalded and cooled
1 cake dry yeast soaked in 1/2 cup lukewarm water.
2-3 cup butter
1 level tsp salt
8 cups or more flour
1 1/2 cups chopped nuts, raisins or currants.
2 eggs
2-3 cup sugar
Rind and juice 1/2 lemon
1/2 level tsp ground nutmeg or cardamom.

In the evening, break and soften yeast in lukewarm water. Scald milk and cool. Cream together butter, salt and sugar. Add beaten eggs, lemon, spice, lukewarm milk and yeast. Work in flour enough to make smooth dough. Knead well, adding nuts and raisins or currants, but keep somewhat softer than for bread. Cover well and let rise. When light turn dough onto lightly floured board. Shape into smooth balls. When half risen in pans cut two gashes at right angles across tops of buns. Let rise until double. Bake about 20 minutes.

in moderately hot oven. While still warm fill gashes with white frosting. Serve hot with butter.

Try a Potpie for Delicious Flavor

Meat and vegetables are combined in many tempting ways, but none more tempting in the opinion of Inez S. Wilson, home economist, than the potpie where the excellent flavor of the meat adds to that of the vegetables and makes the whole dish appetizing.

Veal Potpie with Dumplings

2 pounds neck or shoulder of veal
1/2 pound salt pork
2 or 3 medium sized onions
1/2 cup diced celery
3 or 4 carrots diced
2 cups potato balls
2 tablespoons flour
1 cup small peas
Salt and pepper
Dumpling mixture.

Cut the veal and salt pork into cubes. Cover with water and let simmer for an hour. Then add the onions, diced celery and carrots and season with salt and pepper. Cook slowly for fifteen or twenty minutes, then add the peas and thicken with flour smoothed in cold water. If necessary add more liquid. Drop the dumplings from the end of a spoon and let them rest on top of the vegetables and meat. Cover closely and cook for twelve minutes. Serve at once.

This dish makes almost a meal in itself. The only accompaniment it needs in order to completely balance the meal are a crisp salad, hot rolls, dessert and beverages.



Peas With Fish

PEAS are certainly in the swim when it comes to serving vegetables with fish. Here are two inexpensive recipes for this combination. The first serves four people, and should cost you less than forty-five cents. Tuna Fish and Vegetable Pie: Make a white sauce of two tablespoons butter, two tablespoons flour, one cup of milk and all the liquor from an 8-ounce can of peas and carrots. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Add the peas and carrots and the flaked contents of a 7-ounce can of tuna fish. Pour into a buttered baking dish, and cover top with biscuit dough in one piece, or else cut into tiny biscuits. This should be baking powder biscuit dough, using one-half cup of flour. Bake in a hot oven until the biscuits are well-browned.

With Salmon, Too

This recipe for peas with salmon also serves four people, and should not cost you more than thirty cents.

Buttered Salmon Slices with Creamed Peas: Add one-half teaspoon salt to one and one-half cups boiling water, add one-half cup cornmeal, and cook until thick. Add half the contents of a tall can of salmon, salt and pepper to taste and a few drops of lemon juice. Pack into a greased loaf pan, and let chill. Cut in slices, dip in fine crumbs, and sauté in fat until a nice brown. Make a white sauce of two tablespoons butter, two tablespoons flour and one and one-half cups diluted evaporated milk. Season to taste, and add the contents of an 8-ounce can of peas. Serve with this sauce poured over the salmon slices.
