posits which amount to only about \$85,000.

We note from statements of all other banks in Washington county, which have deposits varying from \$100,000 to \$850,000, that Beaverton is the only one on a restricted basis.

A pertinent question, but we ask it nevertheless, "Is there any reason why the people of this community and adjacent territories should have lost

confidence in the bank's management? Have not the conditions in the past twelve months warranted the loss of confidence?"

Can the citizens of Beaverton continue to let this condition drift along month after month and expect to prosper?
