PICKUP IN TRAVEL TO NORTHWEST DUE IN SUMMER SEASON

With announcement of reduced transportation costs for the summer season, representatives of the Southern Pacific company yesterday predicted a marked pickup in tourist travel to the Northwest this year.

The low rates will be in effect from May 15 to October 15, with return limit of October 31, and will feature material cuts in coach and intermediate fares, it was stated.

All classes of roundtrip tickets to Chicago, to accommodate travel to the World Fair this year will be under the 1933 levels, according to the announcements.

The new fare cuts, together with removal of the Pullman surcharge throughout western and southeastern territory, will make travel costs this summer the lowest in many years, it was pointed out.
