## By Over-Riding of Constitution Holman Seeks a Dictatorship

Behind the recent announcement of State Treasurer Holman that he intends to retain the State Treasury through the primary and general elections, and then, if elected to the governorship, appoint his own treasurer, is a conspiracy to capture our state government.

Briefly stated, it contemplates: First—The nomination and election of Mr. Holman for governor through the influence, prestige and prerogatives of the State Treasury Department—prerogatives so powerful that they will reach into the very financial structure of our State.

Second—The retention of the State Treasury Department by Mr. Holman after his election to the governorship until such time as he assumes the duties of chief executive of the state, whereupon he will appoint a man to succeed him as state treasurer, whose mind runs along with his politically.

As Governor, Holman would then control, and could fill with his own political henchmen, the following important offices, boards and commissions:

Public Utilities Commissioner, Corporation Commissioner, Insurance Commissioner, Budget Director, Director of the Department of Agriculture, Superintendent of State Police, State Highway Commission, Industrial Accident Commission, State Game Commission, State Fish Commission, State Board of Forestry, State Board of Higher Education, State Board of Health, State Parole Board.

As governor, through his subversive state treasurer, Mr. Holman would automatically gain control of the State Board of Control, which exercises jurisdiction over our state institutions and could supplant every employee of these state institutions from superintendent down to the gardener with his own political supporters.

Automatically, in the same manner, Mr. Holman would also gain control over the State Banking Board, which exercises jurisdiction over our banks, the State Land Board with its school fund, the State Tax Commission, which levies and collects our taxes, the State Reclamation Commission, the State Printing Board, the State Library Board.

Politically, Mr. Holman would be monarch of all he surveyed, and the State would suddenly awake to find itself in the grip of a gigantic political machine, which would rule it financially and industriously, as well as politically.

And how does Mr. Holman propose to execute this coup d'etat for his political aggrandizement?

He proposes to achieve it by the simple trick of holding onto his present office as State Treasurer, and allowing two elections to elapse, so that the people cannot elect their own state treasurer to succeed him.

It Out-Huey's Huey Long, and if Mr. Holman is successful in carrying it out, we will have at the head of our state government, a "King Fish" who will stand head and shoulders above Louisiana's notorious salon.

The question is, will State Treasurer Holman get away with it?

Will the people of the State of Oregon stand for it?

## Delzell to Enter Congress Race

W. A. Delzell of Marion county, is a candidate for the democratic representative in congress from the first Oregon district.

Mr. Delzell in more republican years has previously campaigned for this same office. He was secretary to Governor Pierce, secretary of the state board of control and state purchasing agent during the democratic administration. From 1905 to 1912 he was cashier of the First National bank of Klamath Falls, farmed in Klamath county, has been a school teacher and while a resident of Oklahoma prior to that served as assistant state auditor. He has been a resident and taxpayer in Oregon for 29 years, has seven children and has long been a member of the grange and an advocate of its measures, according to his statement.

He is a decided advocate of Roosevelt's "new deal" and pledges support to the administrative program. He is for currency reform, for reduction of the interest-burden on people and government, prosecution of financial blue sky law violations, prosecution of those involved in fraudulent ship and air mail subsidies, for reasonable veterans' compensation, pensions and hospitalization, fullest federal development of Bonneville power and rigid control of the liquor traffic, his statement says.

"As a lifelong follower of Jefferson, I am fundamentally opposed to any form of dictatorship," said Mr. Delzell. "For the past dozen years our country has been ruled by an invisible oligarchy of wealth—the worst possible form of dictatorship. In order to drive these money lords from the temple of liberty, congress temporarily conferred extraordinary powers upon President Roosevelt. He is using those powers wisely, and when the purpose is accomplished for which they were granted, I shall vote promptly to restore them to congress and pray that never again may our temple of liberty be desecrated by the worshippers of the god of Mammon." ## Death Comes to R. S. Robinson Veteran Pioneer

Rawleigh S. Robinson, aged 76 years, 11 months, 26 days, who died suddenly at his home on the Scholls road Saturday morning, was born in a log cabin on the William J. Robinson donation land claim four miles south of Beaverton which they settled on in 1851 and where Mr. Robinson has resided ever since, never being absent from the farm more than a month at any one time.

Mr. Robinson took great pride in his farm and home which he hewed out of the wilderness, and especially in the livestock upon the farm. He was a rugged pioneer and a hard worker in his younger days, being active to the last, and was assisting in feeding the stock the morning he was stricken. He was a firm believer in honesty and paid his bills promptly and told with pride that there never had been a mortgage upon his farm.

On October 12, 1882, Mr. Robinson was united in marriage to Emma Jarred, and they celebrated their Golden wedding anniversary on October 12, 1932. To this union were born three children: Ora E. Sylvester, of Halsey, Oregon; Harry L. Robinson, at home; and Bessie Behm, deceased. He also leaves two sisters, Mrs. Agnes Walker, 83 years of age, who crossed the plains in 1851, and Florence Robinson, aged 78 years, and six grandchildren, Eunice Sylvester, Grace Behm, Mable Behm, Chester Robinson, William Robinson, and Evelyn Robinson.

Mr. Robinson was an active citizen in the community and a member of Charity Lodge I. O. O. F. No. 75 at Tigard, Oregon, for over thirty years. Funeral services were conducted by Rev. Charles F. Clarke of Beaverton, in the Oddfellows Hall at Tigard, Tuesday, May 1. Final rites were read by the Charity Lodge I. O. O. F. at Crescent Grove cemetery.

Arrangements were in charge of W. E. Pegg, Beaverton.

## James W. Mott Recognized By His Party Leaders

James W. Mott, of Salem, present Congressman from the First Congressional District of Oregon, has made one of the outstanding first term records of the 73rd Congress.

He has placed the First Oregon District in the most secure and important position it has ever occupied in the National House of Representatives. He is a member of the two standing committees of the House which together control more than half of all the legislation which directly affects the district he represents.

His work in congress at this session has been directly instrumental in bringing more federal money to Oregon than has ever been granted in any session of Congress.

In National legislation he has begun a career which, in the opinion of his colleagues, marks him as one of the future leaders of the House.

He is one of the few new members who has been recognized by his party leaders by appointment to official position in the floor organization of the House.

Congressman Mott had planned to return to Oregon to campaign for reelection, but due to pressure of business in congress he is prevented from carrying out the plan. He is a member of the committee on public lands, and is forced to remain in Washington, as the committee is considering an amendment to the Oregon and California land fund act to provide for reimbursement, through direct annual payment to the counties of western Oregon for tax losses incurred through the reversioning in the federal government.

## Martin Favors Highway Building Program

Continuance of the federal emergency highway building program in co-operation with the states, which probably will bring another \$6,000,000 to Oregon within the next three years, will be assured through further appropriations by congress expected soon, according to a statement received by friends here from Congressman Charles H. Martin.

Congressman Martin has been in the fore of the battle for more appropriations for highways through his membership on the important roads committee of the house of representatives. He has advocated and worked for these new deal appropriations, which would result in decreasing drastically unemployment in Oregon, as well as the rest of the nation.

As a member of the roads committee, Congressman Martin helped obtain for Oregon the five coast bridges and he worked consistently for the roads and highway bill which brought \$6,000,000 to Oregon.

His support of the plan for appropriating \$50,000,000 for national parks and forest reserves in the western states, will bring additional federal money to Oregon.

## REPRESENTATIVE JOHNSON OUTLINES PLATFORM

During the past week Representative J. O. Johnson who represented Washington County at the last regular and two special sessions of the legislature, in addressing the Kinton Grange and members of the Cedar Mills Farmers Union outlined a definite and constructive program for necessary legislation during the coming session.

In reply to numerous questions asked by members of the Farmers' Union at Cedar Mills Mr. Johnson replied on the question of sales tax to the effect that he had voted against the sales tax on three occasions during the past sessions of the legislature, which in his opinion should satisfy voters of Washington County that he endeavored to honestly represent them.

Mr. Johnson advocates the following legislation according to his statement in the Voter's pamphlet.

"Public distribution of hydroelectric energy including state construction of power lines if federal government fails to provide for distribution.

"Declaring gasoline a public utility and subject to price regulation. Lower gasoline prices, lower gasoline tax and lower license fees for private carriers.

"Combat the gangster and bootlegger by vigorous enforcement of Oregon liquor control act and by lowering liquor prices.

"Reduction of school taxes on real property by consolidation of districts and aid from state funds.

"Prevent monopoly by opposing any further extension of branch banking in Oregon."

## J. M. Devers to Seek Nomination

J. M. Devers, candidate for the republican nomination for congress in the First Oregon District, has been granted a leave of absence without pay from his duties as attorney for the state highway commission and will devote the next three weeks to an intensive campaign for votes during which he expects to visit every county in Western Oregon.

Mr. Devers has been delayed in starting his campaign because of the press of important legal problems before the highway department demanding his personal attention, including the final negotiations surrounding the Coast Highway bridge bond contracts to which Devers has devoted much of his time during the past year.

Devers is also stressing the necessity for just and fair compensation to and treatment of veterans and their dependents commensurate with the service performed and the sacrifice made; wholesome but rigidly effective regulation of all public utilities interstate in character; regulation of all issues of stocks, bonds and other securities for the protection of the investing public; legislation to insure labor its just share in the fruits of its toil; a stabilized and compensating price level for all products of the farm and orchard and federal regulation and control at the source of the motion picture industry to prevent the destructive influence of immoral pictures.
