EX-BANK HEAD ARRESTED

E. E. WIST HELD

E. E. Wist, ex-president of the defunct First National bank of Scappoose, Or., was arrested on a bench warrant issued in federal court on a federal grand jury secret indictment. Wist is charged with making false entries in books of the bank in connection with the amount of cash in the safe and with making a false report to the controller of currency as to the amount of money the bank had. The Scappoose bank was a member of the federal reserve system.

Wist was brought to Portland by Loran Cochran, deputy United States marshal, and was arraigned before Kenneth Frazer, United States commissioner. He gave bond of \$3000.

The Scappoose bank ceased operations on September 28, 1932. Wist's entries, according to the government charges, were greater than the amount of money the bank had at the time the notations were made.

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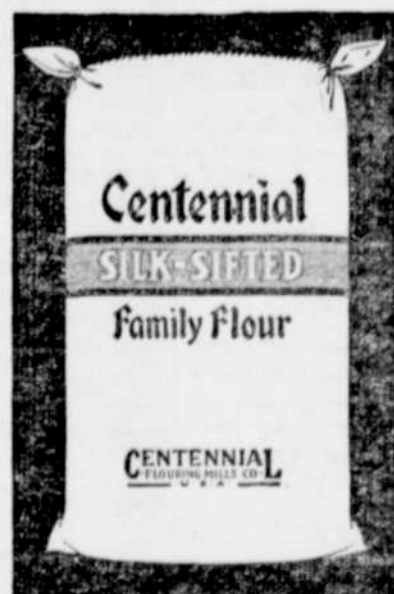
