"Happy Days" Opens Sunday At Hillsboro

First Annual County Grocery Picnic Feature at Park on Sunday

The 28th annual "Happy Days" celebration to be held in Shute Park, Hillsboro, day and night, July 1, 2, 3 and 4, is sponsored by the Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce.

There will be rides, shows, fireworks bands, baseball, dancing in the big pavilion, and many other attractions during the entire celebration. Shute Park is an ideal place for picnics, and is provided with tables, benches, cool mountain water, shade and other advantages.

The \$125 in cash prizes offered to winners in the men's race has attracted more than forty entries from Oregon, Washington and California. It is a go-as-you-please race from Portland to Shute Park, Hillsboro, and is an exciting event. There is no entry fee.

The opening dance will be held Saturday night, June 30, and an eight piece orchestra will furnish the music. The queen and four princesses will be selected at this dance. The queen's ball and coronation ceremonies will be held in the auditorium at 9:00 p. m. Tuesday, July 3rd.

The Washington County grocers will hold their first annual picnic at the celebration grounds Sunday, July 1. There will be a potluck luncheon at 1 p. m., and sporting events with many attractive prizes offered to the winners.

Also on Sunday will be the boys and girls pet parade sponsored by the Business and Professional Women's club.

A large force of men are improving the grounds and remodeling the buildings and putting the park in first class condition. There is no admission fee to the park, people can come and go as they please. There will be a splendid fireworks program at 9 the night of the Fourth.

Clubbers End Big Time More Adults at Session

The Four-H summer session broke all records for numbers at Oregon State college and the regular adult session showed an early increase of 100 students over the low point of a year ago, which college officials point to as an indication of the lightening of both the financial and educational depression.

Total club registration was 787 compared with 561 last year. Of these 319 were boys and 468 were girls. Leaders commented on the exceptionally high type of youngsters present and their interest in their work and the uniformly good conduct. The adult session brought an early enrollment of 370 not counting those to come for later term courses or those in field parties.

This year a summer session geology camp is being maintained in the upper John Day region in eastern Crook county in charge of Dean E. L. Packard of O. S. C. school of science and Dr. Ralph Luper of W. S. C. Students are attending from those two colleges and the University of Oregon.

Depositors Asked To File Claims Promptly

Depositors of the Bank of Beaverton are requested to file claims on their accounts with the liquidator, Mr. Searcy, at the bank building at the earliest possible date. It is hoped, according to Mr. Searcy, to have all claim blanks mailed to depositors this week. Dividends will be paid only on claims filed at the bank, therefore it is very important they be on record. At the close of the 90 days necessary from a legal standpoint, a dividend will be declared on all funds collected in the intervening time.

Arrangements are underway to move the old bank to the room now being occupied by the First Security Bank, in order that the new institution will have the use of the main part of the structure in order that they as well as the depositors may transact their business more conveniently.

Regular banking hours will be observed during the liquidation of the assets. Miss Dessinger and Miss Whitworth, of the old institution, are assisting Mr. Searcy with the work.

Counties to Receive Motor Vehicle Revenue

Counties in Oregon will receive semi-annual payments from fees collected from motor vehicle registration and transportation licenses about July 15. Washington county portion is \$24,425.99.

A fixed amount is now received by each county twice a year, with apportionment made on the basis of the 1931 registration in each county. In prior years the total amount disbursed varied according to net receipts from the number of registrations made during the year. With a fixed sum available, county courts can estimate budgets for road purposes more closely and depend on definite amounts from such sources in each of the semi-annual apportionments.

Anyone wishing to see all the members of the county court, may do so by visiting the Court on Wednesday of each week, which is regular court day, according to County Judge Templeton. In the past many persons have traveled a considerable distance to interview the members of the court, only to find them out. League to Raise \$1155 Outside of \$7500 Rockefeller Benefit for Research

Regional Agricultural Credit Corp. Being Liquidated

Will Transfer \$10,000,000 Loans to Production Credit Assn.

Transfer of approximately \$10,000,000 of loans made by the Regional Credit corporation of Spokane to the books of the 31 production credit associations dotted over the four Pacific northwest states was begun this week by the Farm Credit Administration.

The move is the first wholesale effort towards liquidating the RACC and will materially strengthen the newly set up local production credit associations by adding substantially to the business on their books, according to A. C. Adams, general agent of the Farm Credit Administration, in an announcement made today at Spokane.

The 31 production credit associations now have cash advances of \$3,064,659 outstanding, so that a \$10,000,000 transfer would more than triple the business on the books.

Under the plan, the local production credit associations will purchase for investment, current notes held by the RACC. Purchases will be supervised by the Production Credit corporation of Spokane, holding corporation for the 31 associations. Funds will be provided by the Federal Intermediate bank, Spokane, which will take the notes on a rediscount basis.

Farmers and livestock men whose notes are so transferred will benefit by having their notes placed under the "close-to-home" jurisdiction of the association in their own district, which is managed by a local board of local farmer directors.

Interest rate of 6% charged by the RACC will remain unchanged unless the Regional borrower whose note is transferred wishes to purchase Class B stock in the local association in an amount equal to 5% of his loan, under which circumstance, the rate will be reduced to the current 5% charged by the PCAs. No one will be required to purchase association stock, however, it was made clear by John A. Schoonover, president of the Production Credit corporation.

"Notes transferred must meet the approval of the farmer-directors of the local association buying the collateral and must prove eligible for rediscount with the Intermediate Credit bank," said Mr. Schoonover. "There is no pressure to be brought to bear on anyone."

"The RACC is in process of liquidation, its loan functions having been replaced by the production credit system set up the forepart of this year, and we regard the transfer plan as one of good business for the borrower, the Regional, and the individual associations."

"Under this plan, RACC borrowers will not have to make separate loan applications to the local PCA should they desire to become members, and so receive the benefit of the lower 5 per cent interest rate. Too, they will know in advance whether their paper is acceptable by the Intermediate Credit bank."

"In case the borrower desires to renew or extend his loan, then only will he be required to become a stockholder in the local production credit association."

HARVESTS 450 TONS OF HAY

The farm of H. L. Robinson in the Hiteon district, is what is termed as one of the busy places in the county. Hay harvesting and baling was in full swing at the farm last week, 450 tons of hay being cut from the fields. Last year 6000 bushels of wheat, oats, and barley were harvested from the 340 acres farmed by Mr. Robinson.

Besides these seasonal duties, the regular every day tasks, such as supplying Brandes Creamery with 2000 pounds of milk each week, caring for 67 ewes, rearing 92 lambs and general farming, leaves little time for play in the Robinson family.

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
