



Tomato blight has apparently hit tomato patches all around Washington county rather seriously during the last ten days. Numerous inquiries as to control have been received by county agent, Wm. F. Cyrus. No satisfactory control method has been developed so far as is definitely known. Various remedies have been suggested and occasionally somebody has heard about something or other being effective, but so far most of these remedies have not worked out successfully.

Blight is a virus infection which is transmitted only by the beet leaf hopper. According to information concerning the disease, the virus is carried over the winter in the bodies of these leaf hoppers. No satisfactory control for the insects has been developed. About all the gardeners can do is to pull up the diseased plants as they appear and destroy them. This is not a definite control or even a preventative of spread in all cases, but it may help somewhat in keeping down development through an entire planting. Even plants that have made considerable growth and are thrifty may be attacked and while not killed outright they stop growing, the leaves turn yellow, and what fruit there may be on them ripens prematurely and is of a very poor quality. Anything that creates a disagreeable condition as possible for the hoppers may be of benefit. Sulphur, lime, Bordeaux spray might all be used as repellants, but it should be definitely understood that these things are only suggested as possibilities. They might all prove ineffective so far as spread of the disease is concerned.

TILLAMOOK—Considerable agitation against growing turnips for cow feed has been started in Tillamook county, based on the supposition that they flavor the milk and thus the cheese, and although the charges have not been proved, the result will probably be a marked decrease in turnip acreage in the county this year, according to C. H. Bergstrom, county agent. It has been stated that milk from turnip fed cows may be classified separately and its use prohibited in making cheese.

CORVALLIS—Without question there is a substantial place for Reed Canary grass in many parts of the overflow land along the Columbia river in Multnomah, Columbia and Clatsop counties, says G. R. Hyslop, chief of the plant industries division at O. S. C., who has recently held some meetings and made some observations in these districts. Many farmers have been trying it out on land that is under water a large part of the winter, and they have been getting very satisfactory pasture. Professor Hyslop says. The seed is sown broadcast, generally rather late. Some cover it by use of a hay rake, and this year some are using a corrugated roller, as the ground is rather dry at the surface.

DALLAS—Cherry crop injury from syneta beetle was cut in half in those orchards that were sprayed or dusted this year, estimates J. R. Beck, county agent, after a careful check of 18 orchards in all sections of the county. Growers who did not spray or dust lost from 25 to 50 per cent of their cherry crop through injury from the beetle, he says. Dusting machines were used in most cases, although two that were inspected had used liquid spray.

DIVIDEND CHECKS RETURN

Salem, Ore., July 6—Approximately half of the letters, containing di-

vidends of stock in the Guardian Building & Loan association, which is being liquidated by the state corporation department, have been unclaimed. Charles H. Carey, state corporation commissioner has announced. The dividend aggregates 6 per cent. Carey said that the inability of his department to obtain addresses of many persons having accounts in the association had delayed the liquidation proceedings. He urged all those having claims to notify his office immediately.

There are approximately 11,022 accounts and 4826 checks have been mailed out. Letters were returned unopened from 3503 persons who had filed claims.

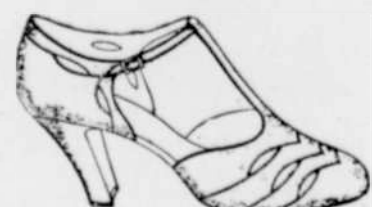
