Pre-School Clinic Being Conducted by P. T. A.

A complete physical check up for each child who is to start school next fall should be taken as the responsibility of his father and mother. Early attention is strongly advised so that any defects may be corrected and the child returned to normalcy before launched upon his new career.

School clinics have been organized for this purpose by parent teacher associations, thus including many children who would not otherwise have the advantage of physical inspection.

Such inspection must be considered as second choice and cannot be advised as a substitute for an individual physical examination at the family physician's office, when both father and mother can be present. This examination surely deserves as much attention as mother gives to her spring house cleaning and as much as father gives to over-hauling his car.

Few house wives would check as to the number of cob webs to be removed, the amount of dirt to be scoured from the floors and walls and then content herself with having made such a survey; yet many mothers and fathers will permit cavities to go unfiled, diseased tonsils to remain, crossed eyes to remain crossed and poor vision to go uncorrected.

It may be found that as with curtains, rugs and screen doors a few minor repairs are necessary and as with the rugs a change may be necessary so too much wear is not placed upon one spot, but altogether and in the long run it will probably be found that a saving has resulted because of "early discovery" with the increased chances for "early recovery." Most certainly with the examination well done and recommendations carried out a greater sense of security will result and an increased feeling of well being so the joy of living will be increased.

CHARLES RUGGLES WHEELS 600 HENS FOR MORE EGGS! BUT THE BIRD'S WON'T GIVE!

Charles Ruggles, screen comedian and farmer, who is currently featured with Lanny Ross, Mary Boland and Ann Sothern in "Melody in Spring" the Paramount film at the Ritz Sunday and Monday July 15 and 16, is thinking of writing a book on the successful raising of poultry. Ruggles is dividing his time between working at the Paramount studios, and watching the health of his 600 hens on his San Fernando ranch.

"I have found," said Mr. Ruggles sagely, "that a hen, properly encouraged with kindness, courtesy and a bit of grain, will deliver an egg with sufficient regularity to pay her own way."
