(above) close-up view of the stamp. Cost of the stamps is paid entirely by the grower. The income from these stamps is used in administering the Market Agreement which sets all minimum prices on melons and tomatoes in Oregon and Washington. Each crate of cantaloupes bears a 7c stamp. Stamps may be obtained at Early Market, Portland, or County Agent, Hillsboro.

To the Public Also to Melon-Tomato Growers

In our desire to keep in touch with the public and with the growers, aiming to keep them informed as to our activities, we are addressing you today. It is our desire and the whole purpose of the Marketing Agreement to insure better marketing conditions and to bring to the growers at least cost of production; to assure the consumers they may have good articles at no increase in price; that we may assure the legitimate channels of trade by the enforcement of this Agreement that we will use every effort possible to stop the piling up of Melons and Tomatoes, which in the past has been the cause of depressing prices through dumping; and at prices which no grower can compete with.

The minimum prices in all cases have been fixed at cost of production based on the theory that supply and demand regulate the prices above that point. The minimum price does not guarantee the growers a profit, but if enforced will assure them cost of production.

FIRST SECURITY BANK

Adopts Washington County Bankers Assn. Schedule of Service Charges

Approved by NRA

EFFECTIVE AUGUST 1, 1934

What does your banker do with your check after he cashes it for you or credits it to your account? It is just a piece of paper and worthless to him until he presents it to the bank on which it is drawn. Few people realize that to do this and obtain payment on the check is a process which causes the banker considerable expense and often times takes anywhere three days to two weeks.

It is a well known fact that banks in the past have been performing many free services—services which have cost considerable sums—without receiving any sort of pay in return. With earnings capacity now reduced by stricter Government regulations on loans and investments, and a steady increase in the cost of operation due to such things as higher rates of Burglary and Robbery Insurance, and the costs of Federal Deposit Insurance banks all over the country have long realized, that—For a Bank to be Sound it Must be Operated Profitably and Adequate but Reasonable Charges made for Valuable Services.

The Schedule of Charges adopted by the Washington County Bankers Association was put in effect by them last February and has been approved by the National NRA Code Committee. All checking accounts are to be regulated by what is known as the "measured service schedule." The customer has full control of what he shall pay for checking account privileges by regulating the number of items to be handled by his account, or by maintaining a balance of sufficient size that the earnings of the account will pay the costs.
