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GOVERNMENT UNDER THE NEW DEAL

There may be one or two more now, for their rabbit-like faculty of reproduction makes an accurate estimation of their number at a given date practically hopeless.

Since March 4, 1933, 97,000 employees have been added to the Federal Civilian pay-roll. The place of every employee made jobless by the Economy Bill has been filled and 97,000 more have been given Federal jobs. The Federal pay roll for the month of June was \$91,500,000. That was \$2,000,000 more than the pay roll in May, and \$13,000,000 more than the monthly pay roll in November, when the Civil Service Commission first reported the figure. It should be remembered that not a few of the new agencies had been established long before November, 1933.

Four days before the President took office the Federal government had 563,487 men and women in its civilian employ. Sixteen months after he took office there were 661,504. The figures are so big that they are easier to grasp if it is recalled that the Federal civilian pay roll is within 30,000 of its war time strength. Indeed it may have passed war time strength for the net gain in the thirty

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days of June was 3,750 permanent employees, for May 15,000 and for April 20,000. Whether the pay rolls have not been padded a little is a difficult question. It is interesting to note that in the Civilian Conservation Corps 31,000 government workers are apparently necessary to manage 350,000 conservation campers. Even the most expensive schools do not indulge in one master to every ten pupils. The government is growing like mushroom in the dark, and no one seems to know just how or how long it will go on.

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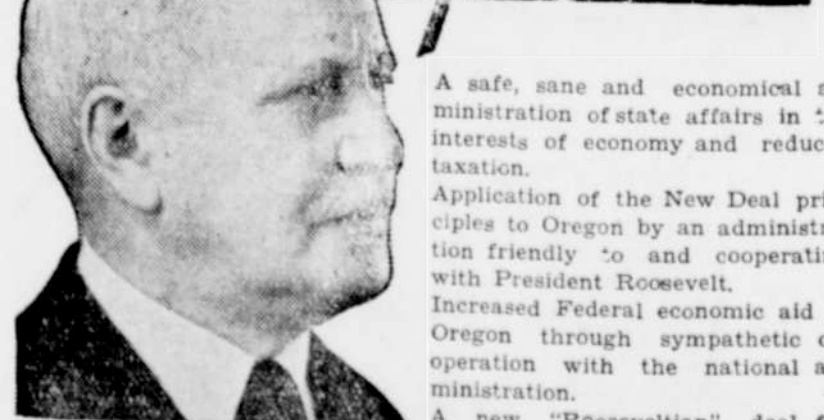
