90% of Contracted Wheat Land May be Sown

Official announcement has been received from the wheat administration at Washington that the wheat seeding for the 1935 crop on those farms under wheat allotment contracts may be 90 per cent of the producers average annual acreage. Last year it was 85 per cent. Detailed information concerning the use in 1935 of contracted acreage and regarding benefit payments, etc., have not yet been received but are expected shortly. As soon as these details are all in hand, a letter will go to all those contract signers in Washington County informing them of these details. It is expected that these will be available before the seeding of the 1935 crop begins.

County Court Resigns From Relief Board

The appointment of three new members of the Washington county relief committee, came about due to the resignation of the county court, who feel that their entire time should be devoted to the administration of county affairs. New members are W. G. Ide, Hillsboro; W. C. Schultz, Forest Grove, and Bert Hagen, Tigard.

Following is the letter of resignation submitted by County Judge Templeton and the Commissioners.

To the County Relief Committee of Washington County, Oregon. Effective with the date of this communication we, the members of the County Court of Washington County, Oregon, terminate our services on the County Relief Committee of this County.

Chapter 15, Section 6, of the Oregon Laws enacted by the Special Legislative Assembly of 1933 provides in part as follows:

"Within each county there is hereby created a county relief committee to consist of seven persons, three of whom shall be members of the board of county commissioners or county court or shall be persons selected by members of the board of commissioners or county court. The remaining four members shall be appointed by the governor, who shall name the chairman. Members of the county relief committee shall continue in office for the duration of the emergency period, unless removed as herein provided."

The termination of our services on the committee is not motivated by any desire to escape any duties attendant on that service, neither are we moved to this action by reluctance to give our time or efforts. With the expansion of the State and Federal relief activities there has arisen a conflict of interest between the County and the State and Federal Relief Agencies. We do not feel that we can serve both the County and the Relief Committee and do justice to both. Our first and paramount duty is to the county and the taxpayers of the county, and we feel that we can best serve the County by discontinuing our services with the Relief Committee. We also feel that by the appointment of those three citizens of the County whose names we have submitted to you as our successors that the interests of the Relief Committee will be better served, as each of these gentlemen can and will render an excellent service to the committee and to the people, and they will not experience the conflict in interest which has handicapped the members of the County Court.

Be assured that we are ever ready to cooperate with the Relief Committee in carrying on the relief program in Washington County.
