TOLL INCREASES

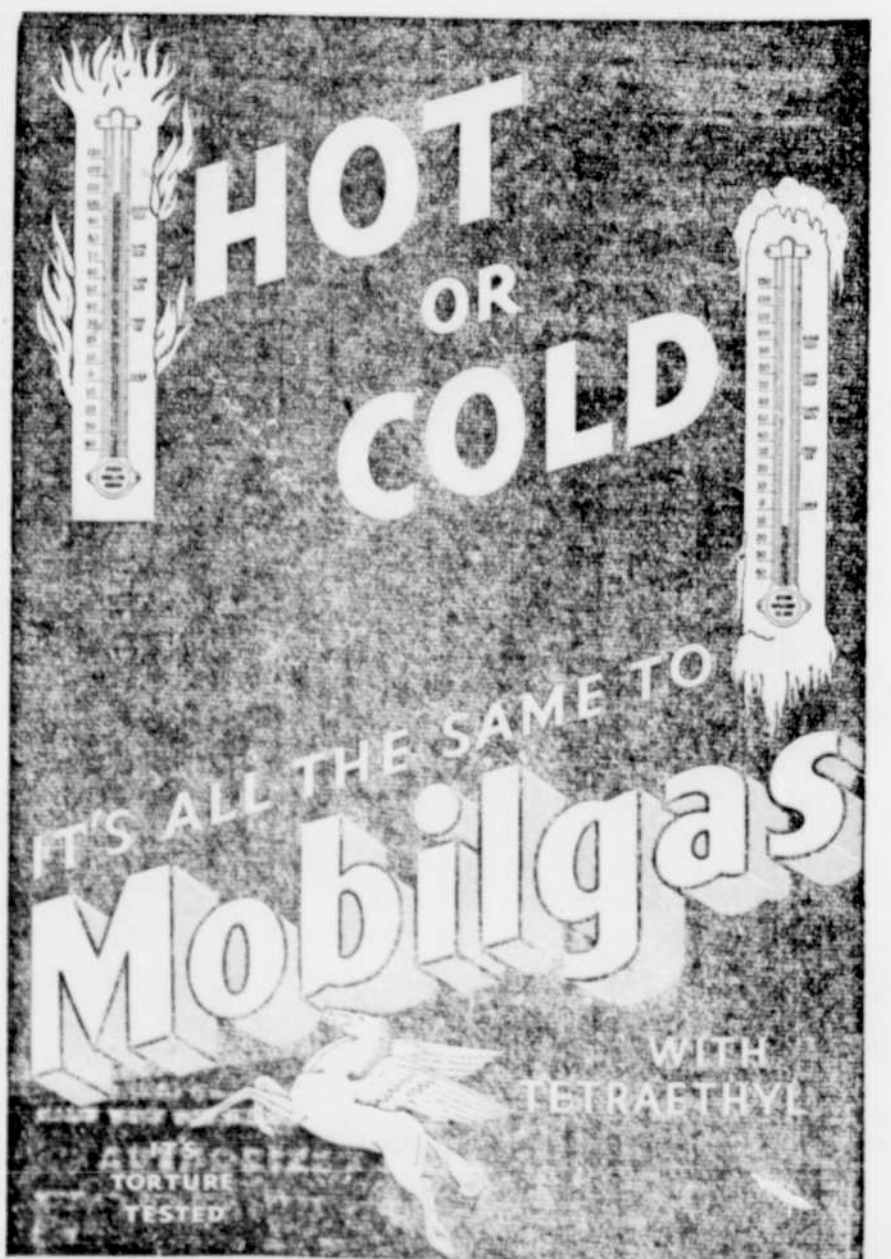
