And this is bound to be the result if homes are too apathetic to defend public education, although it has born the double burden for decades. The decline in educational budgets should arouse all parents and teachers to action for the good of their children. At this time education is threatened by slow starvation through lack of funds, which have been filched from public finances or allocated to less vital problems of government. Parents, your demand is the source of good schools your defense of schools is the only hope in this period of taking stock and reconstruction. Will you sponsor a community gathering, make a speech, send a letter or telegram to your president and legislators, demanding that education shall be a public trust, supported by everyone?

"Sacrament" Topic of Lesson Service

"Sacrament" is the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, January 13.

Among the citations which comprise the Lesson-Sermon is the following from the Bible. "When thou prayest, thou shalt not be as the hypocrites are: for they love to pray standing in the synagogues and in the corners of the streets, that they may be seen of men. Verily, I say unto you, They have their reward" (Matt. 6:5.)

The Lesson-Sermon also includes the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "When thou prayest, enter into thy closet, and when thou hast shut thy door, pray to thy Father which is in secret; and thy Father which seeth in secret shall reward thee openly." So spake Jesus. The closet typifies the sanctuary of Spirit, the door of which shuts out sinful sense but lets in Truth, Life and Love. Closed to error, it is open to Truth, and vice versa. The Father in secret is unseen to the physical senses, but He knows all things and rewards according to motives, not according to speech. To enter into the heart of prayer, the door of the erring senses must be closed" (pp 14, 15.)

A \$1.50 Dinner for 6



HOW can I serve a dinner to six people with a good meat, two vegetables, bread and butter, a fruit, cream and coffee at a cost of twenty-five cents each? Very easily if you do your marketing carefully. Here's the menu:

Lamb Chops 70c
Parsley Potatoes 12c
Bread and Butter 11c
Lima Bean Salad 24c
Pear Cobbler with Cream 28c
Demi-tasse 5c

Lima Bean Salad: Drain one 8-ounce can of lima beans, add one tablespoon chopped onion, one-fourth cup chopped celery and one-fourth cup chopped cucumber, and marinate in four tablespoons

French dressing for at least one hour. Add two slices fried bacon, broken or cut into small pieces, and serve on lettuce leaves.

Pear Cobbler: Mix two tablespoons sugar with one-half tablespoon flour, and add with one tablespoon butter to the pears from a 1-pound can. Bring to boiling, and pour into a baking dish. Make a baking powder biscuit dough of one cup flour, two teaspoons baking powder, one-half teaspoon salt, two tablespoons shortening, one tablespoon sugar and six tablespoons milk, and drop by spoonfuls on top of the pears. Bake in a hot—450°—oven for ten to twelve minutes. Serve hot with one cup plain light cream.*
