H. E. COSBY TALKS ON TURKEY PROBLEMS

Cosby. The quality of the poult is very directly affected by the feeding of the hen prior to the egg laying season. Hens should be on a well balanced breeding mash by the first of January and the mash should be one that furnishes an adequate supply of those nutrients used in a production. Cod liver oil and green feed are two very essential feeds. Cod liver oil should be supplied in the mash for several weeks prior to the laying season. Turkeys consume large amounts of green feed and where this is not supplied by the range it must be supplied by the grower. Succulent green feed is of greater value than the dry green feed. Experimental data indicates that it costs about 27 per cent more per pound to raise turkeys on the dry feed than on the succulent.

Growing turkeys require a great deal of protein. Consequently, chicken mashes are not satisfactory in turkey feeding. Furthermore, the female poult requires more protein than the male. Since it is not practical to attempt separating them for feeding it is necessary to raise the protein requirements to that of the female poult and feed this ration to all the birds.

In conclusion, Mr. Cosby remarked that in order to hold the poultry industry in the west it is going to be necessary for the grower to build up a better breeding and management and to hold down disease which is the one factor which drove the industry to the west.

Following Mr. Cosby's talk there was considerable discussion of problems of specific interest to the growers present. At the meeting, it was decided to hold another meeting to discuss brooding. This meeting will be held March 27.
