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STRIKE

The ominous word "strike" is again heard on the Pacific Coast. Unions have called "lockouts" against certain tank steamship lines which refused to accede to the demand that no one not belonging to a union be employed.

Entirely aside from the merits of either side of the employer-employee disagreement that has disrupted steamship operations for more than a year, this fact is highly significant; The new strike was called in violation of the agreement entered into by the union at the time the federal government started its arbitration proceedings. In other words, union heads saw fit to call a new strike—even though the arbitration board, in which they had expressed confidence, is still at work!

It has been observed that when the steamship strikes began, public sympathy lay with the strikers. There were grounds for believing that labor on some ships had been underpaid and overworked, and the public wanted these matters corrected. However, it was not long before that sympathy was lost—violence, broken promises, and the spread of misinformation by radicals were the worst enemies of the union cause. Today, with ships tied up again, the public's mood is one of justified anger. It will not submit to domination of the worker by capital—and at the same time, it will not submit to domination of the public interests by unions which represent only a small proportion of workers.

Begin Advertising Now

Newspaper advertising enjoys the greatest patronage of any form of advertising. Huge corporations spend tremendous sums every year to inform and lead the buyer. The press delivers the goods and gets the bulk of the appropriation.

The situation here is the same as everywhere else. Here the newspaper is the best form of publicity, as well as the cheapest. Merchants who delay their advertising because they do not intend to outspend cigarette manufacturers are losing business through their failure.

It is better for every advertiser to begin modestly and expand than to begin extravagantly and lose money, and

most costly to his business, his faith in anything on the market today that has been put over without advertising we don't know what it is. Every merchant realizes this, even if he does not emulate the example of those who put things over.

Old as Time Itself

Conservatives who think the "Share-the-Wealth movement" is merely a temporary example of economic and social insanity which will soon pass away, are apt to be sadly mistaken.

Father of the movement is Huey Long, who has dramatized an issue which is almost as old as time itself. His theory is that the trouble with the country is that a small group of people have too much money, and that they are gradually starving out the rest of us.

In opposition to Senator Long, economists of all schools bring forth graphs, statistics, charts, which dispute his figures and prove him to be entirely wrong. However, not one American in a thousand ever sees the work of the economists—and the "share-the-wealth" advocates are masters at reaching the multitude. In addition, they have this great advantage—some 10,000,000 people are unemployed, and 20-odd million are on relief. Many of these people are desperate, worried, disgusted with matters as they now exist. They are likely to turn to anyone who can promise them a better day.

This is not to say that "Share-the-Wealth" is going to take the country by storm, and effect a revolution in our social and economic order. But it seems certain that it is going to be a powerful political and financial force for some time to come. If the third party movement actually comes to fruition, there will really be fire-works in 1936—and "Share-the-Wealth" is nearly sure to be the third-party slogan.

WashingtonSnapshots

Passing almost unnoticed, but one of the most important recent moves of the Government, was the decision not to press before the Supreme Court its appeal from the Belcher-NRA case which came from the District Court of Alabama. In that case a lumberman was accused of violating the code hour and wage regulations. The Federal Court upheld his challenge of the Recovery Act's constitutionality, and the Department of Justice took an appeal to the Supreme Court. Attorneys who have studied the case cited it as the strongest test case involving the NRA and New Deal legislation generally. But now the Justice Department withdraws the appeal.

Apparently as long as possible the Administration is going to avoid having the nine elder statesmen of the Supreme Court pass upon the Constitutionality of its enactments. In one case after another, distinguished lower court judges have held against the New Deal's attempt to ignore state's rights and regulate local affairs, such as wages, hours and working conditions. The Government has taken none to the Supreme Court.

The recent statement of ex-President Hoover in which he attacked the New Deal directly for the first time, was received with varying comment in the Capital. Largely the reaction was one of wonder as to whether Mr. Hoover intends to seek the Republican nomination again. Most aggravating to officials was his denunciation of the "economy of scarcity" under which production is curtailed as opposed to the "economy of plenty". Destruction and curtailment of domestic farm products, with a resultant steady increase of foreign sales in this country, is not one of the matters which the Administration likes to have discussed publicly.

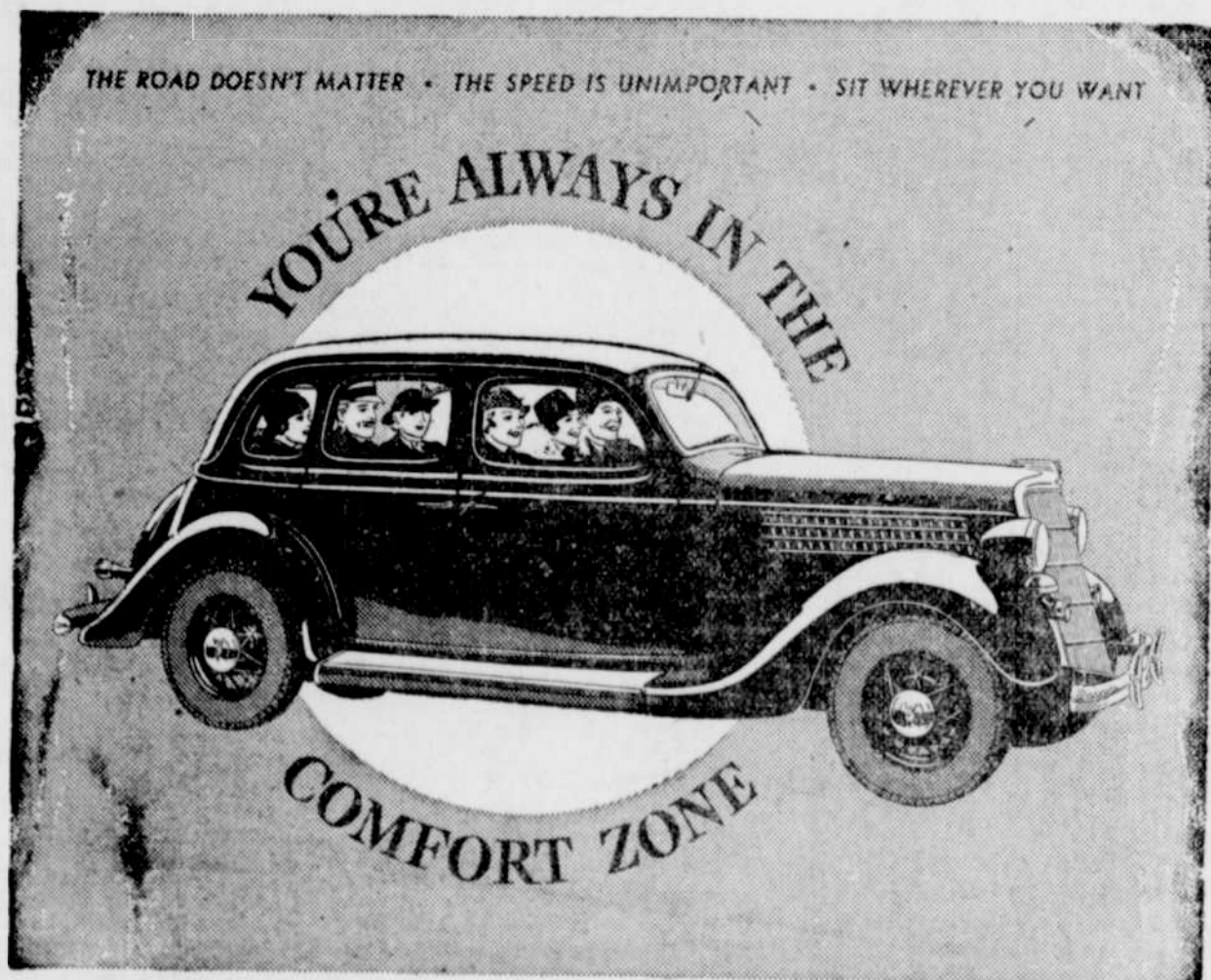
