Emergency Crop Loans Now Available in County

Emergency crop loans are now available and applications are being received daily at the county agent's office. If the amount needed or requested exceeds \$300 the applicant must first make application to the Willamette Production Credit Association, Oregon building, Portland.

If the federal agency refuses the application he may then apply for an emergency crop loan. Minimum loans are \$10 and maximum loans are \$500. The Washington county committee checking the local applications are Omar Fendal, Forest Grove, Ben Heesacker, route 2, Forest Grove, and F. E. Rowell of Scholls.
