

Tigard Students Given Leadership Positions at Linfield College

April 19 — (Special — Three Tigard Linfield College, McMinnville, Or., students were nominated for the student leadership positions in student body meeting at Linfield last week. Richard Nokes junior and president of the Student Christian Movement was nominated for student body president next year. Evelyn Junkins was nominated for vice-president and Doris Sackett for secretary.

Nokes is now president of the junior class and was a member of one of the quartettes sent out by the Conservatory of Music during spring vacation. He is an A Capella Choir member and is very active in the work of his fraternity and on the

sports page of the Linfield Review, college weekly publication.

Evelyn Junkins was named as candidate for vice-president of the student body. Also active in her sorority, in the Student Christian Movement and in the A Capella Choir, Miss Junkin has well earned the right to be a candidate for this important position.

The vice-president must be head of the Lyceum program, promotion work and a number of minor duties that are essential but thankless tasks. Miss Doris Sackett was named as a candidate for secretary of the Associated student body. The secretary must read the minutes at each meeting, keeping rather extensive notes of both student meetings and Executive board minutes. Miss Sackett has had much valuable experience in this type of work here at Linfield. Elections will be held next week.

Martin Reappoints Debt Adjustment Committees

Expressing hearty approval of the work accomplished during the past two years and a desire for the continuance of farm-debt adjustment work through the voluntary committee plan, Governor Martin has appointed committees in each county in Oregon.

The committee for Washington county consists of W. C. Christensen, Hillsboro; H. R. Findlay, Rt. 2, Portland; F. E. Rowell, Rt. 2, Hillsboro; Gus Krause, Rt. 2, Cornelius, and J. M. Vanderzanden, Rt. 2, Banks. All these men have served on this committee previously.

The Governor also has appointed a state farm-debt adjustment committee bringing about thousands of amiable adjustments between farm debtors

and creditors, thereby avoiding the disastrous economic and social consequences of wholesale foreclosure proceedings, he says. They are given credit by national authorities, including the President, for aiding materially in the extensive farm mortgage refinancing operations of the Farm Credit Administration.

Officers of the state committee are O. M. Plummer, Portland, chairman; E. A. McCornack, Eugene, vice-chairman; L. R. Breithaupt, Corvallis, secretary; and Judge Ed. L. Bryan, Junction City, counselor.

District chairmen are George H. Pullenwider, Carlton; George W. Potts, Jefferson; Elmo Chase, Eugene; Glenn B. Marsh, Hood River; E. H. DeLong, La Grande; and Judge Robert W. Sawyer, Bend.

Gill, Portland; Mac Hoke, Pendleton; Kenneth Nielsen, Eugene; Herman Oliver, John Day; Ross Wood, Salem; S. T. White, Salem; F. L. Ballard and R. S. Besse, Oregon State college.

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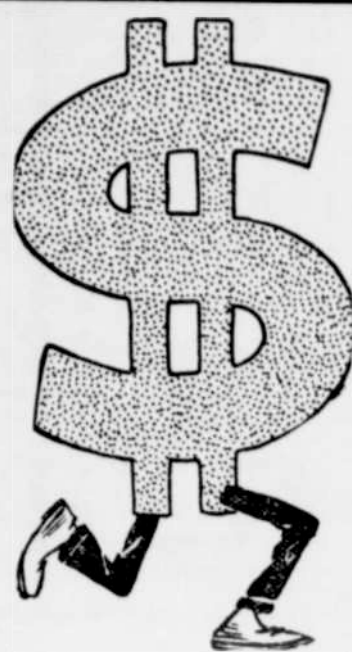
Field Meeting Saturday at Elmer Guerber Farm

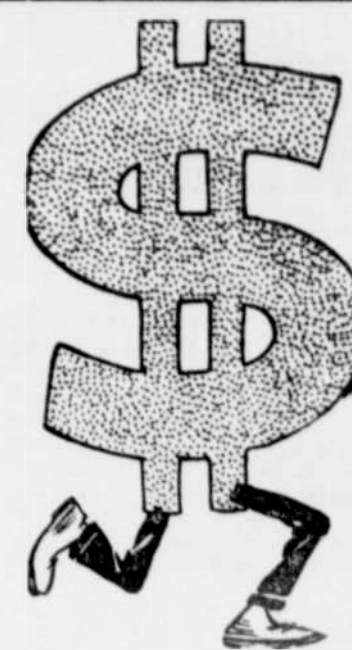


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
