FARM NOTES

from
County Agent's Office

Garden slugs are beginning to at-
tack the vegetables. Very effective
control can be secured by the use of
a bordeaux spray on the plants and
a poison bait. The bait recommended
is a pound of chopped lettuce
leaves mixed well with one ounce of
calcium arsenate. This bait should
be prepared in the evening and scat-
tered along the rows.

The presence of slugs can be read-
ily detected by the chewed leaves of
the plants and the shiny trails of
dried slime which they leave on the
ground around the plants.
Taig and other control measures
for garden pests are found in exten-
sion bulletin 463, "Vegetable Garden
Insect Pest Control," which may be
secured at the county agents office.

Good results have been secured by
the use of sodium chlorate in the
control of canadian thistle and morn-
ing glory. The chlorate treatment
is best used on plots of twenty square
yards or less. It is particularly im-
portant that spring applications be
made on land that is flooded in the
winter making fall treatment imprac-
tical. Applications of sodium
chlorate now at the rate of three to
five pounds per square rod will check
the summer growth and spread of
underground root systems. The
chlorate should be applied in the dry
form and should be put out as soon
as possible in order that the remain-
ing spring rains will have ample op-
portunity to wash it well into the

ground and around the roots. The
treatment should extend two feet be-
yond the edge of the patch in order
to catch any underground runners.
Sodium chlorate is very poisonous,
consequently live-stock should not
be allowed to pasture over a treated
area until there has been sufficient
rain to wash the chemical into the
ground. Considerable caution should
be exercised to keep fire away from
the chlorate because it is very in-
flammable.

Spittle bugshave begun to make
their appearance in strawberry plant-
ings. Past experience indicates that
the nicotine dust is the more effec-
tive. Last year a derris powder prod-
uct was used in a small way in one
or two places with apparently satis-
factory results and will be tried more
extensively this season.

Nicotine dust of a two per cent
strength may be purchased already
mixed or if the grower has some kind
of container just about air tight it
may be prepared at home. Hydrated
lime, 96 pounds and "Blackleaf 40,"
four pounds, makes a two per cent
nicotine dust. Hydrated lime if
used alone, will be much more effec-
tive if two applications are made
about two or three hours apart.

Applying the dust with some kind
of duster is desirable. When dust-
ing is done by shaking a burlap sack
over the plants but very little of the
dust reaches the underneath part of
the leaves. Nicotine may be used
as a spray and this also applies to
the use of the derris powder product
but the dusting is generally prefer-
red by most growers. Any control
measures should be used before the
foliage becomes so large that the
spittle bugs are effectively hidden by
the leaves.

Walnut Blight and Other Nut Troubles Explained

Two applications of Bordeaux
mixture 2-2-50, applied at the proper
times, will give excellent control of
walnut blight in grafted orchards,
according to experiments carried on
by Dr. P. W. Miller, federal pathologist.
Simple instructions for com-
bating this most destructive of wal-
nut diseases are contained in a new
extension bulletin, "Walnut and Fil-
bert Blight and Insect Pests," just
issued.

The first spray for walnut blight
is applied just as the first few fe-
male blossoms open, but before the
bulk of these nut-bearing flowers
come into full bloom. The second
spray is put on after the majority of
the female flowers have been pollinat-
ed, as indicated by the presence of
small brown spots in the blossom
ends.

Control of blight in seedling or-
chards is more difficult because of
the variation in the blooming period
of individual trees, though good con-
trol has been obtained by spot spray-
ing as individual trees reach the
proper stage.

The bulletin also discusses filbert
blight, which must be controlled
largely through sterilizing tools used
in pruning and suckering.

The bulletin may be had free at
county extension offices.

made by several Polk county farmers

ports. Cornelius Buhler, will plant
250 pounds, Emil Stevens 100 pounds
and Martin Van Groos 200 pounds if
sufficient seed can be obtained, Mr.
Beck said.
