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Statehouse Gossip

The Oregon State Police, an organization which has been built up quietly after a hard legislative fight in 1931 to create it, has more than come into the limelight the past few weeks and likewise come in for considerable praise. Former Governor Meier must be given credit for battling the entire legislature for the establishment of the constabulary.

Just a few weeks ago the organization was called upon in the strike situation in Washington county and came off with a creditable showing. Then the quick work in getting the Redmond bank robbers, and at the present writing cooperating fully with the Federal G-Men in the search for the kidnapers of young George Weyerhaeuser.

While much of the credit for the fine organization goes to the caliber of the men themselves, it must be remembered they were selected by their superintendent Charles P. Pray, drilled and trained by him and working under his fine direction. Much credit also goes to George Alexander, deputy superintendent, and to the first work done by Harry Niles, now chief of police of Portland. Oregon has reason to be proud of its state police.

Salem units of the Oregon National Guard and the local veterans of the World War were reviewed on Memorial day by three generals, an unusual event. The generals were Major General Charles H. Martin, Major General George A. White, and Brigadier General Thomas E. Rilea, the latter four years ago when promoted being the youngest brigadier general in the United States. It is claimed there are five major generals and two brigadier generals in Oregon, the largest any state has within its boundaries. This will be checked and their names announced later.

This next week the Oregon National Guard will join with troops from other northwest states in the greatest peace time maneuvers the West has ever seen and the greatest concentration of men under arms in the northwest since the World War. About 7,000 men and 600 officers will be in intensive training for 15 days beginning June 11.

We have frequently heard of political crucifixions where officials have "hanged" themselves by their own ill-advised actions, but not until last.

House Democrat Charges Cabinet "Can't Take It"

Washington—(IPS)—Honest criticism is something the President's Cabinet can't take, according to Rep. Martin J. Kennedy (Democrat) of New York, pinch hitter for the New Deal in the House.

Representative Kennedy wielded a verbal cat-o-nine-tails on Cabinet members by declaring that "what we need now is honest criticism," but that when such is offered "these thin-skinned cabinet members and near cabinet members, instead of making the dignified intelligent replies we would expect, deal in bitter, trivial and intemperate language." He added that "we need the best brains in America, and in my opinion have a mediocre cabinet."

It was Kennedy who a year ago saved the President from defeat on the cuts in veterans' benefits by making a last-minute change in his vote.

Gas Tax Permit Applications Ready

Applications for gas tax refund permits are now ready for distribution, and will be placed in the hands of all residents of the state who have here before been claimants under the refund provisions of the law according to information given out by Earl Snell, secretary of state. Under an act passed by the recent session of the legislature, it is necessary to secure a permit before claiming refund of tax for gasoline consumed in industrial or farming operations, and due to the fact that this law becomes effective June 30th, all claimants should act as soon as possible.

More than thirty thousand claims for gas tax refunds, amounting to \$1,053,042.75, were paid by the secretary of state in 1934. Many of these claims involve field investigation, and an expansion of this work is probable under the new law.

Governor Chas. Martin Proclaims Railroad Week

Acting in unison with governors of most of the states west of the Mississippi river, Governor Charles H. Martin, of Oregon, has set aside June 10 to 15 as Railroad Week and in a statement just released urged citizens of the state to honor Western Railroads for their continued pioneering.

The Governor's statement follows: The State of Oregon has been served for many years by the following railroads, Great Northern, Northern Pacific, Oregon Electric, Spokane, Portland & Seattle, Southern Pacific, and Union Pacific.

These railroads have played a vital part in the lives of our people and have paid, and continue to pay, large sums in taxes. They have furnished employment for many persons. They have joined with other western railroads in reducing basic fares and sleeping car charges and in air conditioning all principal passenger trains.

All these things have meant lowered cost and improved travel service to the traveling public. The governors of western states have asked that the public pay honor to western railroads for their continued pioneering and the Governor of Oregon joins them in asking Oregon citizens to observe Railroad Week from Monday, June 10 to Saturday, June 15, 1935.

When to Spray Cherries

A good many inquiries have come in as to when to spray cherry trees. They should be sprayed just as the fruit begins to color. The formula suggested is 1/2 pound arsenate lead, 2 quarts molasses, 10 gallons of water. Each tree should be sprayed with a quart or 1 1/2 quart of this solution.

Recall of Gov. Martin Meets Opposition

Regardless of Political Affiliations Welfare of State Most Important

Ontario, Oregon, June 7—(Special)—Political agitators have for the past several weeks been gathering together the forces of discontent in preparation for a bitter and determined recall campaign against Governor Charles H. Martin. It was charged here today by H. C. Boyer, president of the Oregon Producers and Shippers association.

Not only is it planned to attempt the recall of Governor Martin, but the same group will seek the recall in Multnomah county of State Senator H. L. Corbett President of the State Senate. Under existing Oregon laws the President of the Senate becomes acting governor in the event of the death or removal of the governor. And those sponsoring this movement do not want Senator Corbett to serve as acting governor in the event that Governor Martin should be recalled. Mr. Boyer revealed in the statement he made public today.

"Although the Oregon Producers and Shippers association is non-partisan and non-political, we believe the impending efforts to disrupt our state government is so serious that the voters of Oregon, regardless of political affiliations, should stand as a unit in resisting this attempt to overthrow orderly state government," declared Mr. Boyer.

"As might be expected, these few ill-advised leaders of political and economic discontent haven't the moral courage to come out in the open. They prefer, for the present, to remain behind the scenes until such time as their insidious propaganda of class hatred had taken root in the minds of those who eventually will be called upon to shoulder the responsibility for this proposed recall campaign."

"The chief trouble with these self-seeking political malcontents is that they do not want as the governor of this state a man who has courage enough to demand and guarantee the observance of law and order."

"This small group of radical agitators, now fomenting this recall agitation are the same ones who, a year ago, gave vocal as well as material support to a communistic labor organization which cost the farmers of this state millions of dollars during the longshoremen's strike. There was a strange bond of sympathy between them and those violent forces which disregarded law and order and brought many of our producers to the threshold of financial ruin."

"During the last session of the legislature, when the producers of this state were making a determined effort to obtain remedial legislation for their own protection and for the protection of the public, it was the last-minute tactics of these same political Judases that defeated some of our plans."

"According to present plans, it is proposed to start the recall petitions against both Governor Martin and Senator Corbett in about six weeks. The welfare of this state is endangered. This agitation must either be stopped or we will be thrown into a state of chaos from which we will be many years trying to recover."

"As a citizen of Oregon, and without regard to partisan politics, I urge the thinking people of this state to stand together in stamping out this pending political racketeering. It is a serious menace to the economic, social and political life of this state. The recall campaign will be based on the flimsy and dishonest pretext that Governor Martin is not in sympathy with the great mass of people. That is the smoke-screen always employed by loud-mouthed opportunists to hide their own hidden motives."

"There is one issue, and only one issue in this recall agitation. It is law and order and decency in state government as against the domination of a radical and ill-tempered few who are dissatisfied at not being able to control the office of governor for their own selfish purpose."

"It so happens that I am a life-long republican, but I place the welfare of my state far above the horizon of party politics. In common with many thousands of republicans and democrats and followers of other political thought in every part of the state, I have a profound admiration for the courage and sound judgment of Governor Martin. To remove him from office at this time would be a dire calamity."
