## Labor Disputes More than Double in Eight Months

In the eighteen months prior to the adoption of the NRA, there were 1,258 labor disputes in which 8,545,360 working days were lost. This cost employes \$26,355,794, employers \$7,248,143, and the public \$156,026,340.

In the eighteen months following the NRA there were 3,214 labor disputes in which 32,220,144 working days were lost. These cost the employes \$106,323,958, the employers \$29,239,087, and the public \$629,437,830. Section 7-A may have given organized labor some moral victories but their losses in hours of work and wages have been tremendous. While strikes and walk-outs were almost tripling in number, the cost to the public was increasing more than 300 per cent.
