heads of those departments, and that he would not interfere in any respect. However, he was told during the past week that the greatest infraction of this rule originated within his own office.

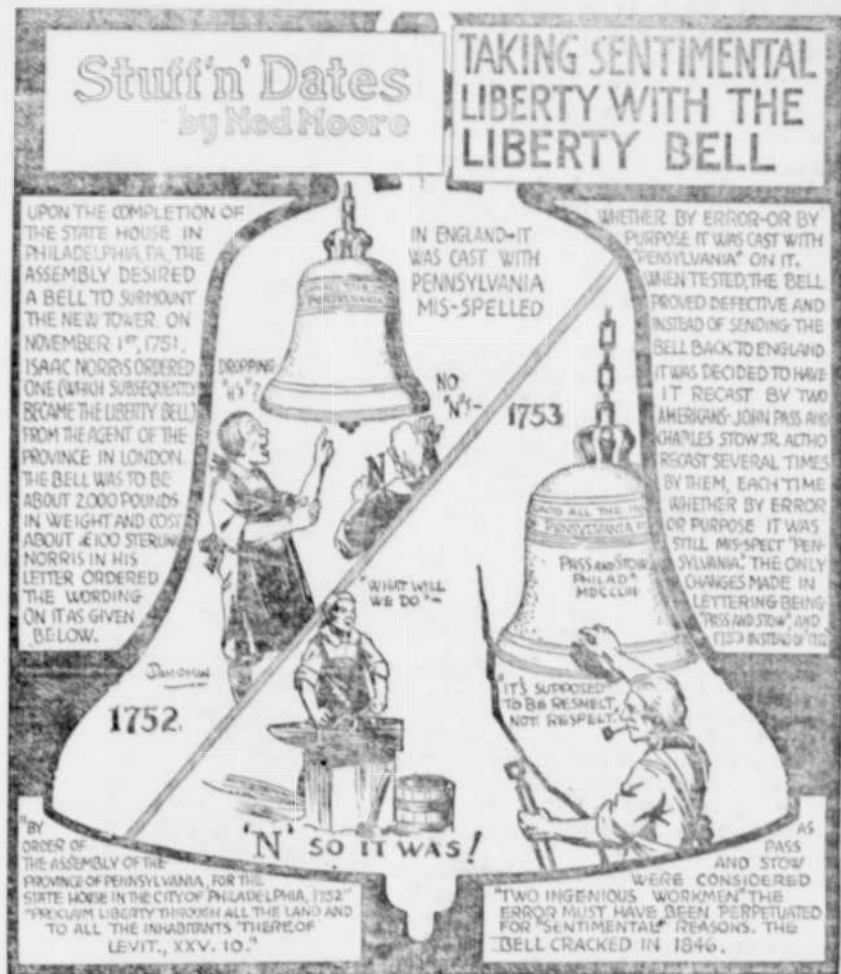
W. L. Gossin (pronounced Jossin) and referred to by the press correspondents and state officials, as well as the Governor as Pinky, due to the pinkish hue of his hair) has been responsible for most of these infractions. He is private secretary to the Governor. He is also the founder of the young Democratic clubs in Oregon and was their first president. Job seekers come to him in hoards and, naturally, he refers them to the appointees of the Governor. But, he goes further and without the knowledge of the Governor sends letters written upon the executive's stationery requesting these young Democrats be named in preference over any other job seekers.

All these facts were brought out the past week when various examples were brought to the attention of the chief executive. Henceforth any interference in the naming of subordinates will be brought directly to the attention of the Governor without first going through the secretary's hands. In other words, the reign of "Pinky the first" in Oregon has about ended, and although he may remain as secretary to the Governor his powers will be very much curtailed.

In his address at Silverton last Sunday he declared "as soon as my election was confirmed and I was inaugurated, I became Governor of the whole people, and that is what I intend to be through out my term." This in itself perhaps is a result of the conference in his office the past week on the "young democrats."

The subject of recall still hangs a pall over the state capital and it was believed the governor has purposely planned many actions as a result. But these, according to those close to the executive, have not been a result of any fear of recall, because the governor, a retired major general, loves a fight. It has only been upon the advice of his close advisers.

Something of his attitude can also be taken from his Sunday speech when he said "I know I have been reviled by agitators and threatened with all sorts of reprisals by some selfish and some possibly sincere influenced. These and others have

not found the governor ready to yield groups which these agitators have under the subterfuge of the recall. I will never curry favor with such groups by going contrary to what I believe to be in the interest of right and justice.

These so called "annoyances," in the words of the Governor, were expected to come to a head this week. It has been repeatedly stated the garage, which meets at McMinnville this week in state convention, was to pass upon a resolution asking the support of the granges in the state for recall against the Governor.

In the meantime, talks of a special session have been circulated around the state office buildings from July to January. It is your correspondent's opinion despite the statement by "Pinky" that the session would be held July 8, that the extraordinary session would not be held before late fall or early winter.

And speaking of special sessions, word from Jackson County this week states that Moore Hamilton, popular young Democrat from Medford has 22 pledge votes for speaker to succeed John E. Cooter. Cooter has been disqualified by an Attorney General's opinion and if renamed by the Lincoln County Court would have to be re-elected to the speakership.

Although William Graham and Howard Latourette both claim support from Multnomah County for that post it has been learned that three

Multnomah votes in writing have been pledged to Moore Hamilton and that others have been promised. It looks like the young Democrat from the first district will succeed a first district Democrat speaker.
