

Roosevelt and Wallace Say AAA Will Continue

Assurances that the work of the agricultural adjustment administration will be continued, with necessary amendment to safeguard it against difficulties encountered by the NRA, have been given by Henry A. Wallace, secretary of agriculture. A statement made by him early in June with the approval of President Roosevelt is as follows:

"In cooperation with leaders of Congress, amendments to the Agricultural Adjustment act are being perfected which are intended to bring the act's provisions as to marketing agreements and licenses into line with the Schecter case decision and also agreements and licenses into line with programs on basic commodities.

"Those voluntary adjustment programs were not in the path of the Schecter case decision and in no event could there be any question of the government's ability to fulfill its contract with farmers.

"Nevertheless, we have taken advantage of the decision to seek perfection in the law which will make certain the government's authority to continue processing tax rates in accordance with amended provisions of the act."

As a result of the overwhelming vote of approval given the wheat adjustment program, new four year contracts are expected to be offered about the middle of July. Provisions are understood to be much the same in general as those in the present contract though improvements are added in a number of details.

Tell Growth of Mother Church

Considering the number of Huey Long clubs and Townsend Plan clubs and other organizations that are bobbing up all over the country all having the same object in view, namely to take money from those who have it and give it to those who have it not, (reversing the dictum of Jesus that the capital of the Unprofitable Servant should be taken from him and given to the man who had shown him and knew how to use it), it becomes interesting to inquire whose wealth it is that is to be shared.

Answering the question thus raised, the Kansas editor directs attention to the fact that in 1932, the bottom of the depression, there were 44,000,000 savings deposits in banks of the United States, representing aggregate deposits of \$24,000,000,000; that in the same year there were 1,545,000 postal savings depositors with deposits of \$118,000,000, and 10,000,000 members of building and loan associations with assets of \$8,000,000,000. These would total 55,000,000 persons, owning \$33, \$118,000,000 and 10,000,000 members holders are added, the grand total represents assets of approximately one half the nation's total wealth.

"UNIFORM MOTOR VEHICLE SAFETY Responsibility Act"

Becomes Effective July 1, 1935

This act applies to any and every individual who operates a car either as an operator or an owner, also to non-residents operating a car in Oregon.

The Act provides that any motorist who fails to satisfy, within 30 days, any final judgment which is the outcome of an automobile accident causing the injury or death of any person, or property damage in excess of \$100, will forfeit his right to drive or register license for any motor vehicle. Further any motorist whose Oregon driver's license, or registration certificate has been suspended for any cause (reckless driving, speeding, intoxication, etc.) must prove his financial responsibility before he is again permitted to operate or register license for any motor vehicle.

HOW TO MEET REQUIREMENTS OF ACT

The Safety Responsibility Law holds no fears for the person who is adequately insured in a reliable insurance company authorized to do business in the state. When holder of such a policy is involved in an accident causing injuries, death or property damage the insurance company guards the interest of the policyholder, pays any judgment resulting from legal liability imposed upon him up to the policy limits.
