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appreciably if at all. In 1929 our gymnasium was built with a \$30,000 bond issue, and the statement was then made that it could be done by proper management without increasing the then prevailing school millage tax. By studying the records it was found that that very thing was done. The debt has now been largely retired and the millage has been reduced rather than increased. This is what is proposed at the present time—we shall seek a \$25,000 bond issue at a rate of interest as low as 3½% if possible. Our present old indebtedness of \$15,000 will be paid up by 1938. We then, by continuing our present rate of paying \$5,000 yearly upon our new \$25,000 bond issue will be able to pay it off in 5 years without changing the present yearly tax. The millage should therefore remain the same. If

our school tax is a hardship it will at least not be any harder but will only be continued for a few years longer.

There is one very important feature that should not be lost sight of in the present discussion. Our new grade school building will be a fire proof structure—and that in itself is worth the expenditure. Our present two story frame building has been standing better than twenty years and a frame building that old is more or less of a fire hazard on account of the possible existence of a defective electric wiring. Our building has been kept in good repair but nevertheless it must be considered as more dangerous than a building of brick or stone. Just one fire with the loss of one child's life or the severe burning of only a very few children would make us feel that our policy of refusing the construction of a fire proof structure had been a short sighted one. To recapitulate our reasons for the construction of a new grade school building are:

1. We save \$20,500 in a cash grant. In what way can we make it easier.
2. We can dispose of bonds at 3½ to 4% interest now rather than at 5½ to 6% in 1938.
3. We can purchase all building materials much cheaper now than later.
4. We give men out of jobs a chance to make a living for themselves and their families for this coming winter.
5. And we can do this without increasing taxes beyond the present rate.
