Babson Says....

The Best Insurance

Babson Prescribes Hedges Against Inflation and Unsound Radicalism

Babson Park, Mass., July 12—The New Deal's latest scheme, the "Share the Wealth" program, is making wonderful newspaper copy. From a broad standpoint, however, it is only a straw in the wind. Like many other measures which have been passed in recent years, its primary motive is to help those who will not help themselves. Investors, instead of crying over split milk, can learn a great lesson from all that has happened in the past few years.

Back to Nature's Investment Program

What should these recent acts of the Federal government, such as the abolition of the gold clause, pressure on the utilities, enactment of discriminatory processing taxes and the creation of a vast Federal debt really teach us and our children? I will tell you what they should teach: That our mortgages, stocks, and bonds can very easily be wiped out under our present form of government. Those who have been relying upon insurance companies and banks for protection may some day be disappointed. Even the Supreme Court may be helpless to prevent a tidal wave of discontent with the Constitution and all that it stands for.

Then, in what should we invest? There must be some real reward for industry, thrift, and courage. Well, perhaps we may be coming back to Nature's system, where wealth of families is measured by the number and character, health and ability of their children. Time was when children were the sole support of parents as they reached old age. Mothers and fathers then depended upon their children, rather than upon rents, interest, life insurance, and bank accounts. Time then was given to training children, both to be economic assets and to have family responsibilities. So my suggestion is to invest more energy upon properly bringing up your children. This is the first step.

What Historians of 1980 May Say

How else should we hedge our bank accounts, stocks, bonds, and insurance policies? Fifty years from now historians may say that the most significant effect of President Roosevelt's New Deal was to brake down the traditional idea of saving and thrift and to shift the emphasis upon "eat, drink, and be merry, for tomorrow we die." Before we are through paying for the experiments of the last three years many investors will have learned by bitter experience that the only real way to get the value out of a quart of milk is to drink it. Hence, I feel very strongly that the best hedge against inflation and unsound radicalism today are investments, not only in children, but in the other fundamentals of life.

The basic investment should be in health. Those who take chances with their health by over-working, irregular

habits, use of liquor, excess smoking, and the like are foolhardy. Lack of exercise and sunshine is a very common error. Start now giving new emphasis in your family to such sports as tennis, golf, fishing, riding, walking, which can be enjoyed through adult years. Any outdoor hobby of this type is the best health insurance policy available!

Rodger W. Babson's Eight Investment Hedges Against

1. Children: Proper character training.
2. Good Health: Exercise and vacations.
3. Culture: Education and Travel.
4. Real Estate: Home or Small farm.
5. Collections: Stamps, Coin, jewels.
6. Furnishings: Paintings, rugs, antiques.
7. Securities: Diversified stocks and bonds.
8. Intangibles: Bank deposits and insurance.

Another important step in this broad program is investment in character building and education. Training in the appreciation and creation of music, dramatics, art, and literature, and intelligent travel aided by a study of history, geography, and nature come under this heading. The great emphasis in all education today should be placed on teaching both adults and children how to play so that they will strengthen their character and build their health at the same time.

Last, but not least, are the tangibles. I have in mind the ownership of a home and garden, a small productive farm. Periods of inflation in Germany, France and other nations show that the owners of real estate—especially homes and small farms—suffered least. Under the heading of tangibles I should also mention collections of precious stones, old coins, and postage stamps. From a purely investment angle, these collections have weathered the economic storms of the ages better than anything else. Works of art, oriental rugs, and antique furniture are especially appropriate hedges against inflation. In addition to their beauty, they have an intrinsic value.

Vacation Excellent "Buy" Now

The above does not mean that good securities, insurance policies, and bank accounts should now be liquidated. In fact, I am bullish on these forms of investments, if well diversified, for the next few years at least. But I do warn investors that the events of the past three years are signposts showing the direction in which this country is drifting. So my advice is not to put all your money in intangible property which may be taken away from you when you need it. Invest some of your money in the ways I have mentioned! Bulwark your security list, your bank deposits, and your insurance policies with the things that make for better and richer living and a fuller and more interesting life!

In conclusion I want to make a "Buy Now" recommendation: Take a good vacation this summer. This year do one of the things that you have always wanted to do but never before felt you could afford. Go away where you can get sunshine and where you can enjoy your favorite sport! After the battering of the past five years your batteries—physical, mental, and spiritual—need recharging. A good vacation this year would be the wisest "buy" you could make in this broad investment program. Stuff 'n' Dates

THE ARMY MANNED THE FIRST SHIPS OF THE AMERICAN NAVY

WHEN CONTINENTAL CONGRESS WAS MEETING IN PHILADELPHIA OCTOBER 1775 IT RECEIVED THE NEWS THAT TWO UNARMED BRIGS WERE SAILING FROM ENGLAND TO QUEBEC LOADED WITH MUNITIONS AS THE COLONIES HAD NEITHER STORES OF POWDER NOR SHOT NOR THE FACILITIES TO MAKE THEM. THE POWERFUL BRITISH BRIGS BY NOVEMBER 1ST FOUR PROMISED VESSELS SAILED INTO THE TIDE. THE HARRISON WARRIOR AND LADY WASHINGTON THE LADY WASHINGTON WAS CAPTURED BY THE ENEMY DECEMBER 7TH. ON DECEMBER 3RD 1775 ESKER HOPKINS WHO HAD BEEN OPERATING AS THE FIRST AMERICAN COMMANDER-IN-CHIEF OF THE NAVY OF CONGRESS FLEET ASSUMED COMMAND OF THE SQUADRON.

OF THESE ONLY THE LEE UNDER COMMAND OF CAPTAIN FAIRLEY ACCOUNTED FOR HIMSELF ON NOVEMBER 29TH 1775 IN THE CAPTURE OF THE MUNITION-LOADED BRIG "NANCY" WHICH WAS RENAMED CONGRESS AND LATER PARTICIPATED IN THE EVACUATION OF BOSTON.

New Ways to Use Sour Cream

Sour cream is considered a real find in most households. Many delicious dishes can be prepared with it. In fact, some of the most popular foreign dishes are popular because of sour cream used in their preparation. This is especially true of Russian cookery and many of their dishes made with sour cream are accepted favorites over the world.

But you no longer have to wait for cream to sour. It is now produced in the modern dairy and is made from rich cream, carefully ripened with a pure culture under controlled conditions. This insures a uniform ripened product with its delicate characteristic flavor. More and more housewives are purchasing this sour cream because satisfactory results with it are assured.

Some unusual and delicious recipes using sour cream are:

- #### Stuffed Tomatoes
- 4 good sized tomatoes
 - 2 tbsp green pepper, diced
 - 1/2 cup bread crumbs, buttered.
 - 6 tbsp sour cream
 - 1/2 cup cooked veal
 - 1/2 tsp salt
 - 1/2 cup cooked rice
 - 4 large mushrooms
 - Dash of pepper.

Scoop out about half the pulp from inside tomatoes. Chop up the scooped out pulp and combine with all ingredients except buttered crumbs. Neatly stuff mixture into tomatoes and cover with crumbs. Place in buttered baking dish with a little water and melted butter, and bake at 375 degrees F for about 30 minutes. Baste occasionally with liquid that accumulates

in the bottom of the pan. 4 servings.

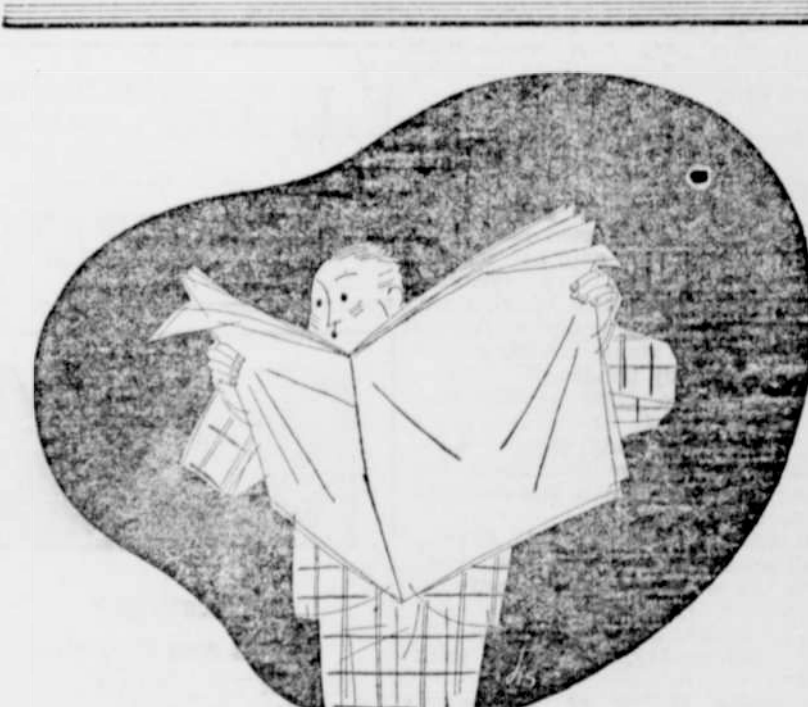
Sour Cream Cottage Cheese Pancakes

- 2 eggs
 - 1-3/4 cup cottage cheese.
 - 1/2 tsp baking soda
 - 1/4 cup sour cream
 - 1/4 tsp salt
 - 1/2 cup flour if cream is thick or 1/4 cup if cream is thin.
- Beat eggs, add cheese, blend well. Sift flour, measure, resift with baking soda and salt. Blend sour cream and egg-cheese mixture; add flour mixture and beat thoroughly. Allow batter to stand about 10 minutes before baking. Dip out about 1/4 cup batter for each cake; saute in butter on moderately hot griddle. Serve hot with butter and syrup, or sprinkling of sugar. Yield: 10 to 12 cakes. (A typical Russian use of these pancakes is to serve them for luncheon with smoked fish.)

Baked Veal or Rabbit

- 1 1/2 pounds veal shoulder cut in 2-inch cubes or 1 rabbit
 - 3 tbsp flour
 - 1-8 tsp white pepper
 - 1 1/2 tsp salt
 - 2 tbsp butter
 - 1 cup sour cream
 - 1/2 cup water
- Roll veal or rabbit in flour mixed with salt and pepper. Heat butter in skillet, add veal or rabbit and brown nicely. Add water and bake at 325 degrees F, first covered for 1/2 hour then uncovered for 1/2 hour. Add sour cream and bake 15 minutes longer at 250 deg. F. Yield: 4 to 5 servings.

Here's News for Meat Lovers

THERE is a shortage this year, so they say, of two and a half million pounds of meat. There are fewer hogs on the farms than at any time within the last fifty years, and the largest decrease in the number of cattle has ever occurred in any one year.

Does that mean that good meat dinners are going to become a rarity? If it does, now is a good time to clip the following menu for a good meat dinner for six people which costs only about \$1.50. Fortunately there is still a lot of nutritious corned beef in cans, and a plentiful supply of circumstance, too, as pineapple is helpful in the digestion of meats.

- Chilled Tomato and Sauerkraut Juice 17c
- Scalloped Potatoes with Corned Beef 33c
- Perfecting Salad 33c
- Baking Powder Biscuits 17c
- Strawberry Shortcake 40c
- Coffee with Cream 10c

Scalloped Potatoes with Corned Beef: Slice five medium potatoes thin. Put in a buttered baking dish alternate layers of the potatoes, dots of butter (you will need four tablespoons of it), and sprinklings of salt, pepper, and flour. Pour over two cups hot milk. Cut the contents of a 12-ounce can corned beef in six slices and lay these on top. Bake about forty-five minutes, or until the potatoes are tender, in a 350 degree oven.

Perfecting Salad: Dissolve one package lemon gelatin in one and a third cups boiling water. Add one cup canned crushed pineapple (not drained) and cool. Add one cup shredded cabbage, one-half cup sliced celery and two tablespoons chopped green pepper, turn into a flat wet pan, and chill. Cut in squares and serve on six leaves of lettuce with a garnish of six tablespoons mayonnaise.

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
