Fall grain is looking very good, but grain sowed in early spring will not have much more than enough straw to it to bind. Cold season and lack of moisture has made the spring crop very unsatisfactory. Baling of hay is practically over in the smaller fields but there are several large fields where the bales are at work.

All day Sunday and during the night traffic was heavy going through Tigard Sunday as that during the end of a three day holiday. Many people went to the beach to escape the heat which started Friday and continued until Sunday evening. Temperature in Tigard ranged all the way from 95 to 105 in the shade.
