State House Gossip

In fact, with the legislative session,
a hard and long one, then the capitol
fire and many reorganizations, Martin
has perhaps been busier than any re-
cent governor, and also he has been
at his office more than Salem resi-
dents have become accustomed to. In-
stead of only being off part of the
time, he would be entitled to consid-
erable more.

And speaking of vacations, Charles
Stricklin, state engineer, the past
week had first vacation in five years.
There are many such conscientious
officials in the state, a fact generally
not recognized by the public. Big

corporations force their employees to
take vacations—it should be compul-
sory for officials. The supreme court
is closed for a month during August.
There will be no more opinions this
month.

The question of a capitol site, giv-
ing more room than now available at
the old site, is still a big one and
must be decided soon. The addition-
al cost of getting more land has been
estimated from \$600,000 to \$1,000,000
in addition to the proposed \$3,500,000
for the building. No decision has
yet been reached.

One thing, has been emphasized,
and that is that a bill for financ-
ing the new capitol would not be re-
ferred. The present plan is for a
direct appropriation over a period of
three years. Since there is no re-
venue raising provision, the bill can
carry the emergency clause, and will,
which makes it effective immediately
upon the signature of the governor.

The contents of the deposit box of
the old cornerstone, which was un-
covered during the past week, will be
replaced into the new structure, it
was announced by the board of con-
trol. In addition, of course, will be
additional materials. The contents
were found in a perfect state of
preservation after being laid away
for 62 years. The interior of the
heavy laden box was only slightly
damp, but very little mold or dust was
seen.
